PROCEEDINGS

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: This is MAJ Les' Melnyk, Army
- 2 National Guard Historian for the National Guard Bureau,
- 3 Historical Services Division, and I am speaking to SSG
- 4 Theodore L. Andrysiak of Headquarters, at Headquarters
- 5 Company, 1st Battalion, 69th Infantry, at the
- 6 Regimental Armory at 68 Lexington Avenue, in New York
- 7 City, on the 17th of September 2001.
- 8 SSG Andrysiak, you've read and signed the
- 9 access agreement for oral history materials and --
- 10 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes. Yes, sir.
- 11 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. I need that out loud.
- 12 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 13 **MAJ MELNYK:** And you understand that whatever
- 14 you say may be -- will be accessed into the archives of
- 15 the Army and may be used for later histories and used
- 16 in that manner, and you have read all the materials and
- 17 signed, with no reservations in terms of withholding
- 18 anything.
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay. SSG Andrysiak, if you

- 1 would begin by telling me, again, for the record, your
- 2 name, your rank, the unit you belong to, and your duty
- 3 position in the unit.
- 4 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. My name is Theodore
- 5 Louis Andrysiak, Staff Sergeant. I'm with Headquarters
- 6 Company, 1st of the 69th, and I am the Headquarters
- 7 Company Communications Platoon Sergeant.
- 8 MAJ MELNYK: And on Tuesday, the 11th of
- 9 September, where were you when you found out about the
- 10 attack on the World Trade Center?
- 11 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** I was at work, sir. I work
- 12 for a -- I'm a technician. I'm a full-time technician
- 13 with [New York State] Department of Military and Naval
- 14 Affairs. I was at Staten Island, at our direct support
- 15 shop at the time that we found out about the attacks.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: And how did you find out about
- 17 the attack?
- 18 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** By television. By television,
- 19 by news. At first, I heard one of our employees had
- 20 gone around and was telling everybody that an airplane
- 21 had crashed into the World -- One World Trade Center,

- 1 and my first thought was that it was a small, maybe a
- 2 small Cessna, the pilot might have had a heart attack,
- 3 made an error.
- 4 And we didn't think much of it, until we heard
- 5 a second plane had crashed into Two World Trade Center,
- 6 and that's when we went to the TV to get the update and
- 7 find out that it was an actual terrorist attack.
- 8 And with much disbelief and sorrow in my
- 9 heart, and I'm sure all my coworkers, the horror that
- 10 we had just witnessed was just unbelievable. Just
- 11 unbelievable.
- 12 **MAJ MELNYK:** The maintenance station at Staten
- 13 Island, is that your normal duty station?
- 14 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir.
- 15 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay.
- 16 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** I'm an electronics technician
- 17 there, working on all communications equipment for the
- 18 lower downstate Army National Guard.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** How long have you been part of
- 20 Headquarters Company and part of the battalion?
- 21 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Since March of 2001, sir.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: And previously, your military
- 2 experience, if you could briefly sum it up?
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Sure, sir. Eighteen years,
- 4 the past 18 years, I've been with Headquarters Company,
- 5 1st of the 101st CAV.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: Which is on Staten Island.
- 7 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Which is on Staten Island, in
- 8 their communications section.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: A lot of COMMO experience.
- 10 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 11 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. What did you do upon
- 12 coming to the realization or did you come to the
- 13 realization at that time that --
- 14 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Sir, my first thoughts were of
- 15 the battalion and what our mission was going to be
- 16 through this, in my eyes, horrible times. That was my
- 17 first thought is of what our unit, battalion, 1st of
- 18 the 69th, was going to do, what our mission was going
- 19 to be. That's where my thoughts first turned.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** You assumed that you would be
- 21 called up.

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir.
- 2 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay.
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. At the time, I
- 4 could not make it into the battalion due to the
- 5 inaccessible access through the freeways and the
- 6 bridges, till things had calmed down.
- 7 So I had reported to the 101st CAV, which is
- 8 on Staten Island. I called the 69th, called the
- 9 battalion, notified them where I was, and I would make
- 10 it in as soon as possible, and which I did that night.
- 11 **MAJ MELNYK:** About what time?
- 12 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** I got -- arrived here at the
- 13 69th about 10:30 that evening.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: And what did you do at that
- 15 point? Did you -- you fell in with the rest of
- 16 Headquarters Company. And what were they doing at the
- 17 time you arrived?
- 18 SSG ANDRYSIAK: At the time I arrived, the
- 19 company was preparing all the equipment necessary to
- 20 move out for the mission at hand.
- 21 I had gathered up all my communications

- 1 people.
- 2 **MAJ MELNYK:** How many did you have?
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: At that time, sir, I had six,
- 4 at that time.
- 5 **MAJ MELNYK:** Normally, you would have?
- 6 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Normally, I would have 15.
- 7 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay.
- 8 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Normally, at that time. At
- 9 the time, I could not make it into the unit and I
- 10 called to the unit and I found out that I had -- in the
- 11 morning, I had four of my soldiers, COMMO Platoon
- 12 soldiers here at the unit. I was at rest because I
- 13 knew my platoon could handle the situation until I got
- 14 there.
- So I was very much at ease, as I'm sure the
- 16 company was, that my platoon could handle and assess
- 17 the situation, what equipment we needed, until we
- 18 arrived on scene.
- 19 And when I did arrive on the scene, they did
- 20 have all -- they had equipment ready and communications
- 21 established for the battalion and I was very proud of

- 1 them, very proud of them.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: So your men had -- your six men
- 3 had already distributed radios for battalion vehicles.
- 4 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 5 **MAJ MELNYK:** What other jobs were they
- 6 required to do?
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: At that time, they had already
- 8 set up an antenna on the roof of the armory, with a -77
- 9 radio. So we had -- one of my soldiers had manned the
- 10 antenna and the radio for about, I think, three hours,
- 11 until relieved by somebody else, to try and keep some
- 12 established communications between the vehicles that
- 13 were already down at the site, at the World Trade,
- 14 ground zero, and in the surrounding area.
- 15 **MAJ MELNYK:** And at what point did you deploy
- 16 forward with Headquarters Company?
- 17 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** That was Wednesday morning, on
- 18 the 12th. That's when we actually went down to ground
- 19 zero.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** And you went as a company or did
- 21 you go with your platoon?

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: No. I went down --
- 2 (Interruption to proceedings.)
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: This is MAJ Melnyk. We had a
- 4 brief interruption.
- 5 We were about to ask you, you deployed
- 6 downtown with your platoon or as an entire company or
- 7 how did you --
- 8 SSG ANDRYSIAK: As an entire company, sir.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: And how did you get downtown?
- 10 SSG ANDRYSIAK: City -- New York City Transit
- 11 buses were provided for us.
- 12 MAJ MELNYK: You went down the West Side
- 13 Highway or you went down the FDR Drive?
- 14 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** No, sir. FDR Drive, sir.
- 15 Yes, sir.
- 16 **MAJ MELNYK:** And where did you stage before?
- 17 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Our staging area was Battery
- 18 Park, down by the South Ferry.
- 19 MAJ MELNYK: And, again, the time that you got
- 20 there?
- 21 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Approximate time we arrived

- 1 was 0830 that morning.
- 2 **MAJ MELNYK:** Wednesday morning.
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Wednesday morning, yes.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: What tasks did you need to
- 5 accomplish at that time?
- 6 SSG ANDRYSIAK: As soon as we hit the ground,
- 7 I touched base with the company commander and found our
- 8 COMMO mission and that was to establish the
- 9 communications -- the command post communications as
- 10 soon as possible, which we did.
- We took an OE254 antenna and actually strapped
- 12 it to a signal lamp.
- 13 **MAJ MELNYK:** Street light?
- 14 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Street light. A street light
- 15 pole, and got communications up in very short time, I'd
- 16 say within a half an hour.
- 17 MAJ MELNYK: Was the battalion command element
- 18 already down there Wednesday morning when you arrived?
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir. I believe the
- 20 battalion commander and the staff were on that
- 21 location.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: And how were they communicating?
- 2 SSG ANDRYSIAK: They were communicating via FM
- 3 through their Humvees at that time.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: And how was COMMO for them? Were
- 5 they having problems? Did they need the extra boost
- 6 from the antenna?
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Well, with the geographic area
- 8 that we were in, it was very hard for the buildings
- 9 that were involved in the line of sight for
- 10 communications.
- 11 So they were receiving and transmitting
- 12 somewhat, to some areas, with antennas off the vehicle
- 13 radios and antennas, but the antenna that we did put up
- 14 gave them a broader shot, a wider shot, and we were
- 15 able to get all the way up to ground zero with -- once
- 16 we established our communications.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** (Inaudible.)
- 18 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** What happened then? Continue the
- 20 story. What further missions did you and the COMMO
- 21 Platoon have to accomplish?

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: At that time, again, basically
- 2 standing by for communications, until our mission had
- 3 changed and that's when the 1st battalion 69th took
- 4 over the escorting of civilians to their homes to
- 5 retrieve their personal items and animals.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: About what time was this?
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: I would say Wednesday was the
- 8 first day that we took over, I would say it was
- 9 sometime mid afternoon, approximately mid afternoon.
- 10 MAJ MELNYK: Where did people arrive to be
- 11 escorted?
- 12 SSG ANDRYSIAK: They were established right --
- 13 there was a train station. I would say maybe two,
- 14 about 200 feet to the rear of our command post, where
- 15 we had set up barricades and fencing, so the civilians
- 16 could gather into one local area.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** In Battery Park.
- 18 SSG ANDRYSIAK: In Battery Park, yes.
- 19 MAJ MELNYK: And how did they get down to
- 20 Battery Park?
- 21 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Sir, most of them walked.

- 1 **MAJ MELNYK:** Really.
- 2 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Most of them walked for miles.
- 3 Yes, sir. Most of the people that I had talked to in
- 4 the crowd, there was some sort of a management
- 5 corporation that was set up down at Pier 40 on the west
- 6 side, Houston and West, and that's where most of them
- 7 had gone for information to get back into the
- 8 buildings.
- 9 But they were told to come down to Battery
- 10 Park to be escorted by the National Guard. And most of
- 11 them, I would say all of them walked to that location
- 12 that we were at Battery Park.
- 13 **MAJ MELNYK:** Coming down the FDR Drive. The
- 14 Guard had cordoned off the west side surrounding.
- 15 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir. They had to go
- 16 around -- they would have had to walk around ground
- 17 zero.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right.
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** The whole west side and some
- 20 of the east side and then down and around to us, which
- 21 was some miles and time for them to walk.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: And about how many people do you
- 2 think gathered down there Wednesday afternoon?
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Sir, Wednesday afternoon, I
- 4 couldn't give you an approximate number for the one
- 5 day, but between the three days that we had the
- 6 mission, which was Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, was
- 7 it -- yeah, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and
- 8 yesterday, Sunday.
- 9 Yeah. I believe it was all of those days. We
- 10 must have processed, between those days, I would say
- 11 anywhere upwards between 2,500 to maybe 3,000 citizens,
- 12 if not more. There was not an exact count that was
- 13 estimated.
- 14 That we did -- that did gather at any certain
- 15 point and were processed through by us into their
- 16 homes.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** And what was entailed in the
- 18 process? Who did the processing? What did they have
- 19 to do in order to be able to go to their homes?
- 20 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Well, how we had it
- 21 established was most of them had arrived with addresses

- 1 the first day, with their addresses written on cards
- 2 already. So when they had arrived into the area that
- 3 we had set up, I basically had them or asked them to --
- 4 you know, for internal cooperation, to help keep the
- 5 crowd motivated, was to work internally and gather by
- 6 address and by building, which was fantastic, because
- 7 they were very cooperative.
- 8 They were very, very cooperative. And as they
- 9 did that, as they gathered into address and by
- 10 building, we were able to process them. All we had to
- 11 do was once we found out the frozen zone and the free
- 12 zone, accessible zone for them to move into, all we
- 13 needed to do was look at an address and we were able to
- 14 ask them is this above the frozen zone or is this below
- 15 the frozen zone.
- 16 **MAJ MELNYK:** So the people in the crowd
- 17 actually helped you determine --
- 18 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. The crowd helped us
- 19 to determine. We had the area mapped out of which was
- 20 frozen and not frozen.
- But, again, we were not familiar with a 100

- 1 percent of all the addresses that were in that area.
- 2 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right.
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: So we asked the cooperation of
- 4 the crowd, of the citizens and residents to give us
- 5 their address and asked them to point out on the map,
- 6 if we were not familiar with it, where exactly were
- 7 they located.
- If one or two buildings had the same entrance,
- 9 so we could bring two -- as long as they were in the
- 10 same entrance, and there would maybe be two separate
- 11 addresses, which, in some cases, we had, that we could
- 12 put them all in that same group and bring them down, as
- 13 long as they were all going to one entrance.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Who was -- who on the military
- 15 side was in charge of the organization down there and
- 16 escorts? Who was the overall commander?
- 17 Was that a Headquarters Company mission? Was
- 18 that -- was there more than that?
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** That was a Headquarters
- 20 Company mission.
- 21 MAJ MELNYK: Only? The line companies were

- 1 not involved.
- 2 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Sir, we did -- no, sir. We
- 3 just -- yes. It was a Headquarters mission. That was
- 4 our mission as Headquarters.
- 5 MAJ MELNYK: So your commander, CPT Daniels,
- 6 was down there on the scene.
- 7 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 8 MAJ MELNYK: Or was that delegated to somebody
- 9 else?
- 10 SSG ANDRYSIAK: No, sir. CPT Daniels was --
- 11 CPT Daniels and the first sergeant were on the scene
- 12 and they were the overall coordinators of the mission.
- 13 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. About how many soldiers
- 14 did you have working this mission, providing escort,
- 15 containing the crowd?
- 16 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Between the two team leaders,
- 17 which was myself and SSG Maybar (phonetic,) with --
- 18 which, without him, working together as a team, we
- 19 would not have been able to pull this off.
- 20 Possibly an amount of anywhere, I would say,
- 21 between 15 to maybe 20 escorts at each different time.

- 1 And, again, without all of the escorts and SSG Maybar,
- 2 this mission would not have been able to be
- 3 accomplished.
- I can't imagine the miles that each of these
- 5 escorts had walked back and forth.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: It was all done walking. There
- 7 was no vehicles taking --
- 8 SSG ANDRYSIAK: All foot, sir. All by foot.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: Now, an escort would take a group
- 10 of, what, 15, 20 people back to their apartments?
- 11 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Sir, we had groups in excess
- 12 of 26 to 30 in a group. With that size of a group, two
- 13 escorts would go with that group to that location, into
- 14 that one building.
- They knew the residents, how much time limit
- 16 they had, they were asked to please gather only what
- 17 was necessary to take out, the important items, which I
- 18 had said to the crowd, I had told the crowd, I says,
- 19 "Please, look to your left and to your right, and front
- 20 and back of you." I said, "Everybody here is in the
- 21 same boat. So, please, gather up whatever you need,

- 1 because we do need the escorts back at the location to
- 2 help us and your neighbors and get everybody through in
- 3 a fair and equitable time."
- And, again, the crowd was very cooperative
- 5 with that.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: So people didn't overstay. The
- 7 soldiers didn't have to go in and hunt them out of
- 8 their apartments.
- 9 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** No, sir. The citizens were
- 10 cooperative, very cooperative. The escorts did have to
- 11 wait sometimes upwards of two hours at one location,
- 12 depending on the crowd that they had and the situation
- in the building.
- 14 Some buildings they had to escort in one
- 15 apartment at a time, depending on the situation with
- 16 that particular building and address, you know, on the
- 17 damage -- you know, how much damage was done to the
- 18 building, if any, depending on if there were cleanup
- 19 crews down there in OEM, Office of Emergency
- 20 Management.
- 21 **MAJ MELNYK:** Thank you.

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: And some -- because one
- 2 building we had that we took down a large group of
- 3 about 26 residents and Office of Emergency Management
- 4 was with the cleanup crew at that time.
- 5 My soldier, one of my soldiers, PVT Gonzalez,
- 6 had called me and had explained the situation to me,
- 7 they have cleanup crews there and they weren't letting
- 8 anybody into the building at that time, until they had
- 9 more of their crew come down to escort.
- I told PVT Gonzalez, I said "You can handle
- 11 the situation. I have no doubt in my mind that you are
- 12 handling what's going on down there at this time." I
- 13 said, "Use your judgment," and, sir, he used his
- 14 judgment 100 percent as all the escorts did that took
- 15 residents down.
- But those were the type missions and type
- 17 escorts. It did take quite some time, because then we
- 18 had to eventually just escort one apartment at a time,
- 19 one apartment at a time.
- 20 MAJ MELNYK: So not in every case, but in some
- 21 cases.

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Not in every case, yes, sir,
- 2 but in some cases.
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: Did you have problems with people
- 4 trying to pass themselves off as residents to go into
- 5 other folks' apartments? Were there any kind of
- 6 looters or other criminal activity?
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: No, sir. We had explained to
- 8 the crowd before we would start and kept a constant
- 9 brief that identifications would be checked. We were
- 10 doing a 100 percent ID check. If they did not have
- 11 their ID, because some residents did have to run and
- 12 they did not have any identification with them, we
- 13 asked them if they agreed to show the escort or an
- 14 officer, if there was one around, police officer, their
- 15 proof of address coming out of that apartment, that we
- 16 would let them go.
- 17 So they would go down with no identification
- 18 and then as they were leaving, they had to show proof
- 19 of identification, identification for that apartment,
- 20 and which they all did, which worked out fantastic.
- We were not going to leave anybody behind with

- 1 no identification, because we understood in that
- 2 situation that some did have to evacuate quickly,
- 3 without any of their personal items.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: During the escorting process,
- 5 were buildings having to be evacuated at that time?
- 6 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. At some times our
- 7 escorts were in the area, the sound, the horn would
- 8 sound, which would -- which was saying that maybe there
- 9 was a chance of a building collapse, and then we would
- 10 have to evacuate the area and all civilians out of the
- 11 area until there was an all clear for us to start
- 12 escorting back in.
- 13 And I have to say, sir, that without police
- 14 presence, which we did not have, we did have some, but
- 15 we ran the operation.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: Down at Battery Park.
- 17 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Down at Battery Park, yes,
- 18 sir. It was requested by myself and by CPT Daniels to
- 19 not have any police presence or involved in our
- 20 operation, because this was not a riot crowd. These
- 21 were residents trying to get into their homes to

- 1 retrieve their personal belongings and animals, and we
- 2 did not see it necessary to have a police presence as
- 3 security for the operation, because the crowd -- we had
- 4 the crowd well under control.
- 5 They were standing for hours, sir, at a time
- 6 in the hot sun. We passed out water and at some times,
- 7 when we could, sandwiches.
- 8 We found where the nearest bathroom was for
- 9 them to use, and basically kept them happy as much as
- 10 possible.
- 11 And it was just an unbelievable feeling, sir,
- 12 to have the crowd work together and be so patient at
- 13 that time, with everything that was going on, and for
- 14 them not to be trying to push forward, not trying to
- 15 come through the barricades, not trying to sneak in, it
- 16 was just amazing.
- I mean, I can't tell you.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** You certainly look like you
- 19 weren't expecting it.
- 20 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** No, sir.
- 21 **MAJ MELNYK:** Your expectations were that they

- 1 would be more trouble than they were.
- 2 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. And what I had done
- 3 was I had listened too -- I stopped to listen to every
- 4 question that was asked. All they were being asked --
- 5 all they were asking us to do was -- is to answer their
- 6 questions, find out information for them, and, I mean,
- 7 even -- sir, there were some individuals that were
- 8 there for four hours, five hours, and they'd find out
- 9 that they could not have access to their building, you
- 10 know, through the chain, we were trying to find out.
- 11 When we came back to them with a solid answer
- 12 and the reason why and with that, they even stood
- 13 there, shook our hands, and hugged us and said thank
- 14 you, you have been the most -- this is -- we have been,
- 15 as the National Guard, they were saying, the most
- 16 cooperative, most informative organization that they
- 17 have had and caring, taking care of their needs, that
- 18 they have had since the whole ordeal.
- 19 That, to me, was the best things in the world.
- 20 MAJ MELNYK: There are -- I think a lot of
- 21 soldiers felt that way.

- 1 **SSG ANDRYSIAK**: Yes, sir.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: That they got as much back from
- 3 the public as they gave in their service.
- 4 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. I mean, some of the
- 5 crowd -- between the crying of people in the crowd,
- 6 believing that they're not going to be able to get into
- 7 their apartments, to see them crying and unsure and
- 8 then coming back out of their apartments with their
- 9 personal belongs and cats and with smiles on their face
- 10 and hugging our escorts and shaking their hands and
- 11 their -- just their appreciation, it just us very hard,
- 12 sir, very hard.
- 13 MAJ MELNYK: So your -- could you expand a
- 14 little on your personal role? It doesn't sound like
- 15 you were an escort. You were back.
- 16 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 17 MAJ MELNYK: You were a team leader. What
- 18 were your responsibilities as a team leader?
- 19 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Basically, sir, I mean, I say
- 20 team leader because it was a team effort. But my
- 21 position and sole operation was to gather the crowd or,

1 I mean, organize the crowd.

2

- 3 **MAJ MELNYK:** By building.
- 4 SSG ANDRYSIAK: By buildings, by address, to
- 5 calm the crowd, to answer all their questions that they
- 6 had.
- 7 That was my main mission, my main mission, and
- 8 as I called an address, they came -- they came out of
- 9 the holding area and then they were turned over to SSG
- 10 Maybar.
- 11 His operation was to line up, again, by
- 12 building, the groups, give them a brief, a safety
- 13 briefing, hand out dust masks, okay, and collect all
- 14 cameras. We could not allow any cameras into the site.
- We did not want pictures taken along the way
- 16 and, you know, if it was insurance purposes for their
- 17 apartments, the escorts themselves collected the
- 18 cameras, held the cameras on the way down and the
- 19 cameras on the way back.
- 20 And at that time, again, in that, SSG Maybar's
- 21 operation, he briefed them, checked all their IDs, and

- 1 then explained to them again, as I had did, please be
- 2 brief, please gather your belongings that are essential
- 3 to you that you need, and animals, and then what was
- 4 told to them was please do not leave your escorts.
- 5 When you get down to the area, please, when
- 6 you come out of your building, stay with your escort
- 7 and come back with the escort, and that's how the
- 8 operation ran.
- 9 And I would say by the third day, which was
- 10 Saturday -- I mean, the operation was very smooth along
- 11 the whole way, but by Thursday, the kinks and whatever
- 12 kinks -- it's the only word I can think of at this time
- is kinks -- were worked out and we ran smoothly, I mean
- 14 very smoothly, and we processed --
- 15 Every day that we were there, by the end of
- 16 the night, we had no residents left in the area.
- 17 Everybody was processed through that needed to be
- 18 processed through.
- 19 MAJ MELNYK: What time do you usually shut
- 20 down?
- 21 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** The first couple of nights, we

- 1 ran -- we started when we hit the ground, which was
- 2 approximately 0730, 0800. We established our
- 3 perimeter, established the area, as a battalion first,
- 4 and then we started our operations.
- 5 Everybody went to their own operations and we
- 6 started ours.
- 7 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right.
- 8 SSG ANDRYSIAK: The first couple of nights we
- 9 ran til about 7:30.
- 10 **MAJ MELNYK:** In the evening.
- 11 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Well, we had -- as I said, as
- 12 far as kinks, about that time, it started to get dark.
- 13 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right.
- 14 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** So the next night, for safety
- 15 reasons, to have all our soldiers back in before dark
- 16 and the residents, we were cutting it off at 6:00
- 17 o'clock in the evening, and that was for safety for the
- 18 residents, as well as for our own soldiers.
- 19 And then even cutting it down to 6:00 o'clock,
- 20 we still processed everybody through. Every group we
- 21 processed through.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: What about your COMMO mission?
- 2 After establishing that, putting up the antenna down,
- 3 were there any other COMMO things --
- 4 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 5 MAJ MELNYK: -- that you all had to take care
- 6 of?
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. We -- as the
- 8 mission went along, there was a need to establish
- 9 another net at the command post, which was accomplished
- 10 by my soldiers and the COMMO Platoon.
- 11 And then there was also --
- 12 **MAJ MELNYK:** How did you do that?
- 13 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Basically, what we did was, at
- 14 the time, when we had MANPAC [PRC]-77s, at the time.
- 15 We could not mount another net into the vehicle at the
- 16 time. So my COMMO Platoon had a -77 MANPAC and ran it
- 17 off of one of the roof antennas on the vehicle, which
- 18 worked out perfectly. Worked out perfectly.
- 19 Another one of our missions was a Charlie
- 20 Company commander's Humvee, which was all the way up at
- 21 the top by Embassy Suites, past ground zero.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: On the west side, on the east
- 2 side?
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: On the west side, sir.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: Roughly, around what street?
- 5 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Right on the river. Again,
- 6 sir, I'm not a 100 percent familiar --
- 7 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay.
- 8 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** -- with the area, but it was,
- 9 I would say, maybe -- maybe a quarter of a mile or less
- 10 past ground zero, on the river.
- 11 **MAJ MELNYK:** Okay. So on the west side.
- 12 SSG ANDRYSIAK: On the west side, yes, sir.
- 13 It was Embassy Suites.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Embassy Suites, you said?
- 15 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Embassy Suites, sir, yes.
- 16 **MAJ MELNYK:** So there was a hotel up there.
- 17 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** Looking at the map now.
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Okay. This is ground zero
- 20 here, sir.
- 21 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right. Area one.

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. I would say right
- 2 along this area, sir.
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: Which is in the World Financial
- 4 Center.
- 5 SSG ANDRYSIAK: In the World Financial Center.
- 6 **MAJ MELNYK**: Okay.
- 7 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Right up around in the World
- 8 Financial Center.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: Where they have the marina.
- 10 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yeah. We went through the
- 11 marina, around, and then I would say right here, sir,
- 12 just past the World Financial Center.
- 13 MAJ MELNYK: Just past the World Financial
- 14 Center.
- 15 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Yes, sir.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: North End Avenue.
- 17 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Around that area, sir, yes.
- 18 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. And what was the problem
- 19 with the Charlie Company commander's vehicle?
- 20 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Their vehicle radio was unable
- 21 to transmit, only receive. So they had a MANPAC -77

- 1 for transmitting and they were receiving from the 524
- 2 and MANPAC transmission.
- Three of us, myself, CPL Rolon (phonetic,) and
- 4 PVT Gonzalez walked up to the area from Battery Park to
- 5 assess the situation.
- 6 When we got to the area, we established that
- 7 it was the radio, in fact, it was not transmitting and
- 8 there was not a handset or anything else.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: So the radio was broken.
- 10 SSG ANDRYSIAK: So the radio was down. At
- 11 that time, PVT Gonzalez pulled the radio out of the
- 12 vehicle, out of the mount, put it on the hood of the
- 13 Humvee, took the covers off, opened the radio up, and
- 14 reset the circuit breaker inside the radio, and put it
- 15 all back together, put it back in the vehicle, and had
- 16 a 100 percent communications with the vehicle.
- 17 So it was a mission well accomplished.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** Given the atmosphere at that
- 19 time, a lot of dust and dirt in the air, I imagine you
- 20 probably had a lot of breakdowns.
- 21 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** No, sir. Communications went

- 1 well, sir. That was, to my knowledge, the only
- 2 communications -- real communications problem that we
- 3 had.
- 4 Again, the area itself and the buildings and
- 5 the geographical location of everything was, I would
- 6 say, the hardest part to overcome.
- 7 MAJ MELNYK: Because the line of sight wasn't
- 8 established.
- 9 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Line of sight, yes, sir. Line
- 10 of sight was difficult to establish. But between
- 11 relaying, if we had to, between companies to other
- 12 companies or vehicle to vehicle from the command post,
- 13 which we did, if it wasn't a direct contact between the
- 14 receiving station, communications worked well.
- 15 MAJ MELNYK: Did all of your orders come from
- 16 CPT Daniels or did you interface directly with police,
- 17 fire, other civilian elements that were giving you
- 18 orders?
- 19 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Sir, during the operation with
- 20 the residents, I did touch base with the police command
- 21 post.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: Located where, do you know?
- 2 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** In Battery Park.
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: They had a command post in
- 4 Battery Park.
- 5 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes. At the museum, I
- 6 believe, that's there. There's a museum.
- 7 MAJ MELNYK: I think that's the Customs House.
- 8 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** Right across the street they
- 9 were.
- 10 **MAJ MELNYK:** It looks like a museum.
- 11 **SSG ANDRYSIAK:** I think it was a museum.
- 12 Yeah, well, it was right across the street and that's
- 13 where the police command post was set up. And I had
- 14 touched base with them. I needed a bull horn, for one,
- 15 because by about half the day, my voice was gone.
- 16 So I finally was able to come up with a bull
- 17 horn until HHC was able to -- the 69th was able to come
- 18 up with one for me, which they located quite quickly
- 19 for me, which helped out.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** So most of your communication
- 21 with the crowd was being bull horned.

- 1 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: For --
- 3 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Until I lost my voice, yeah.
- 4 But it had to be one of the most uplifting missions
- 5 that I have ever entailed in my 18 years of service.
- 6 It was just unbelievable. I enjoyed interfacing with
- 7 the community 100 percent, as well as Sergeant Maybar
- 8 and the escorts that were part of the team.
- 9 It was just -- as I told the crowd, that was
- 10 the best -- that was the best part of our mission, of
- 11 what we do, was helping the community and helping the
- 12 residents, and I did, I stressed that to the crowd many
- 13 times through the days that we were there, that this is
- 14 the best part of our mission is to help these people
- 15 and get them in and handle their needs, which we did
- 16 above and beyond, sir, above and beyond.
- 17 And, again --
- 18 MAJ MELNYK: It sounds like you're --
- 19 SSG ANDRYSIAK: Yes, sir. I'm very proud.
- 20 And, again, between the escorts and everybody else,
- 21 without one of those, the mission would not have

- 1 worked. It would not have worked.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: Is there anything else that you
- 3 want to add that you experienced, that you think is
- 4 noteworthy or interesting?
- 5 SSG ANDRYSIAK: One thing I'd like to say,
- 6 again, as I had told the formation earlier today, that
- 7 I am proud to be on the ground. Words can't say how
- 8 proud I am to be on the ground with the 1st of the
- 9 69th.
- 10 And for this mission, for any future mission
- 11 that comes, that happens, whatever that mission may be,
- 12 I am proud to be here with the 1st of the 69th, and
- 13 this is my home and this will be my home, if not for
- 14 anything beyond my control, this will be my home, and
- 15 that's a fact, sir.
- I am proud to be with these soldiers, I can't
- 17 say it enough, and with the command staff, LTC Slack,
- 18 CPT Daniels, LT Whaley (phonetic,) all the command
- 19 staff, sir.
- I am very proud to be part of this unit.
- 21 MAJ MELNYK: Well, thank you very much.
