- 2 SSG MORIARTY: This is SSG Dan Moriarty of the
- 3 126th Military History Detachment. Today is the 1st of
- 4 October 2001. We're at Battery Park.
- 5 This interview is with -- if you could say your
- 6 name, sir.
- 7 MAJ FISCHER: MAJ John T. Fischer, New York State
- 8 Naval Militia.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** I'm going to read the legal stuff
- 10 here to keep the Center for Military History happy.
- I understand that the tapes and transcript
- 12 resulting from this oral history will belong to the
- 13 U.S. Government, to be used in any manner deemed in the
- 14 best interest of the U.S. Army as determined by the
- 15 Chief of Military History or his representative.
- I also understand that, subject to security
- 17 classification restrictions, I will be given an
- 18 opportunity to edit the resulting transcript in order
- 19 to clarify and/or expand my original thoughts.
- The Army will provide me with a copy of the edited
- 21 transcript for my own use, subject to classification

- 1 restrictions. The Army will provide you that about,
- 2 you know, the time that you're (inaudible) commission.
- 3 Do you have any conditions or restrictions you'd
- 4 like to put on this?
- 5 **MAJ FISCHER:** No.
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: Okay. If you could just initial
- 7 there and sign on this space down here.
- 8 (Phone ringing.)
- 9 **MAJ FISCHER:** Is that me or you?
- 10 **SSG MORIARTY:** That's actually (inaudible).
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible.) No, maybe it is me.
- 12 Maybe it is you. It's the one thing with cell phones
- 13 --
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, it's me.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: Okay. (Inaudible.) I'll take it
- 16 (inaudible).
- 17 (A brief recess was taken.)
- 18 SSG MORIARTY: And we'll resume this interview.
- 19 I'm assuming you were at your civilian job --
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Correct.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- when this happened?

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: Yes, I was.
- 2 **SSG MORIARTY:** And where is that?
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: I was at a corporate staff meeting
- 4 located at Asheville, North Carolina.
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, really?
- 6 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** I work for Southeastern Container
- 8 Incorporated and our headquarters is in Asheville, so
- 9 we were down there having a corporate meeting when
- 10 someone interrupted our meeting to tell us that a small
- 11 plane had crashed in the twin tower or the World Trade
- 12 Center. And then as things developed and we turned on
- 13 a television (inaudible) for a while, and we finished
- 14 the meeting on Wednesday.
- Then Wednesday afternoon, since couldn't fly back
- 16 because of the airports being shut down, so I drove
- 17 non-stop from Asheville to my home in Londonberry, New
- 18 Hampshire. I threw on my gear the next day and then
- 19 came down here.
- 20 (Phone ringing.)
- 21 **MAJ FISCHER:** Sorry. I'll just turn it off.

- 1 SSG MORIARTY: Okay. Now, you drill with -- you
- 2 drill with the New York State Militia --
- 3 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 4 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- but you live in Londonberry?
- 5 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, I'm associated with them, a
- 6 New York unit so --
- 7 SSG MORIARTY: So you come down from New York for
- 8 your drills?
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah. (Inaudible), yes.
- 10 SSG MORIARTY: Do you do this monthly or is it
- 11 like the Guard where you go to --
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: I'm -- I'm on call. I'm a special
- 13 staff officer.
- 14 SSG MORIARTY: Oh. Oh, okay. Okay.
- 15 **MAJ FISCHER:** So I was trained (inaudible)
- 16 biological/chemical defense and also disaster response
- 17 emergency preparedness.
- 18 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, really.
- 19 MAJ FISCHER: So --
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 21 MAJ FISCHER: -- that's what I was doing for a

- 1 while. I worked, of course, with FEMA. I was trained
- 2 as an EPLO at Mount Weather.
- 3 So all this disaster response thing I'm, you know,
- 4 at least fairly knowledgeable about it, you know, more
- 5 than most people. So that's the reason why they had me
- 6 come down.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** So you were (inaudible), okay.
- 8 Were you -- have you been used in that capacity at all?
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: Well, I was a liaison officer. I
- 10 understand how logistical requests should be processed.
- 11 I understand that, you know, how it works through --
- 12 OEM through CIMO (phonetic), over to FEMA or, you know,
- 13 back down the military side, you know, working that
- 14 way.
- 15 You know -- so that's basically the capacity I was
- 16 in for, you know, the first I guess week or so.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** As a liaison between --
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: The JTF, joint task force and the,
- 19 you know, the director that I was supporting. I was
- 20 working as one of his aides as the, what they call an
- 21 OEM forward, which was actually ground zero.

- 1 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. You're prior military also?
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. I served four years active
- 3 duty in the Marine Corps.
- 4 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 5 MAJ FISCHER: In (inaudible), and then I went into
- 6 the reserves.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** You -- was it during that time that
- 8 you were in Desert Storm or were you in reserves?
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: I was with the -- I was a reservist
- 10 with the Second Battalion, 25th Marines.
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: And you got called up?
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. Half of our battalion went
- 13 over to Saudi. The half I was with was (inaudible) to
- 14 Camp Pendleton and we were training for the -- for that
- 15 (inaudible) Marine expeditionary force that was going
- 16 to be the amphibious assaults.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: And we were training for that, and
- 19 then from there I took orders to Fort McClellan for
- 20 their nuclear, biological and chemical defense school.
- 21 So I went through that course at Fort McClellan. So

- 1 that's how I got the MOS for NBD.
- 2 SSG MORIARTY: I did that NBD defense course in
- 3 Connecticut. It's -- it's -- I'd like to go through it
- 4 two or three more times.
- 5 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: You know, because it's -- it's just
- 7 so foreign, you know, the way we do things and -- but
- 8 (inaudible) particular biological and chemicals are the
- 9 cheapest ones around.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: You know, a smart guy or a terrorist
- 11 group can figure it out just using industrial
- 12 chemicals.
- 13 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah. Yeah, well that's -- the
- 14 crop dusters and all that kind of stuff.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: What they call a poor man's atom
- 16 bomb.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah. Yeah, and it's a scary
- 18 thought. It's -- you know, you just mix that chemical
- 19 and that chemical so --
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** So, okay, coming -- coming back to

- 1 here, you were at ground zero?
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: Well, I checked in. The first night
- 3 I was at the police academy where they were kind of
- 4 marshaling us up, and that was their temporary
- 5 emergency operations center.
- 6 **SSG MORIARTY:** This was Wednesday night now?
- 7 **MAJ FISCHER:** Thursday.
- 8 **SSG MORIARTY:** Thursday?
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: Thursday evening, because the EOC in
- 10 the World Trade Center, you know, was destroyed.
- 11 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: They went and stood it up in the
- 13 police academy --
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: -- until they developed the one
- 16 they're in now, pier 92. And once they stood that up
- 17 and they dislocated everyone from the police academy
- 18 over there, at that point I was then assigned out as an
- 19 aide to a Chris Koslow (phonetic), who was working for
- 20 OEM.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. And what was he doing?

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: Well, he was -- he was kind of one
- 2 of these mystery guys. I think they brought him up
- 3 from D.C. He was Department of Justice type, but he
- 4 was assigned to the mayor's office.
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: So, you know, he wasn't -- he was
- 7 kind of discrete about exactly, you know, who he was
- 8 and what he was doing, but all we were told was to work
- 9 for him.
- 10 **SSG MORIARTY:** Do whatever he said to do?
- 11 **MAJ FISCHER:** Exactly.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. And what was he having you
- 13 do?
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Well, you can see my logbook.
- 15 Mainly it was to (inaudible) control of the situation,
- 16 you know, identify where -- where the buildings were
- 17 housing people, where, you know, the supplies are being
- 18 stored, what kind of supplies were being stored, find
- 19 out how we were going to be able start getting the
- 20 buildings ready to be taken over by the landlords,
- 21 basically kind of an organizational strategy towards

- 1 the supplies, and all the volunteers, and the people
- 2 and try to get some kind of system to it.
- 3 It was basically fairly chaotic between all the
- 4 rescue personnel, all the deployed, you know, units.
- 5 You know, there was search and rescue and, you know,
- 6 the fire department units and all that.
- We were trying to make sense of who was where,
- 8 what they were doing, and that was kind of the job
- 9 that, you know, he was tasked with so --
- 10 SSG MORIARTY: And I'm curious because that's
- 11 something I haven't thought about at all was the
- 12 landlords --
- 13 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- particularly buildings that were
- 15 threatened --
- 16 **MAJ FISCHER:** Uh-huh.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- by other buildings. Now, what
- 18 was their role?
- 19 **MAJ FISCHER:** Well, they were standing up. I
- 20 guess they had Turner Contracting, a company called
- 21 AMEC. There was a couple of others. There was four of

- 1 them in total that were actually being tasked at taking
- 2 different areas of the zone and bringing in their
- 3 people and their workers to try to clean out the
- 4 buildings, identify structural problems, you know, do
- 5 some damage assessment, and then come up with a plan of
- 6 action to get the buildings, you know, back to, you
- 7 know, being useable.
- What we found like, you know, like with the AMX
- 9 building, was that really the first two floors were
- 10 taken over by firefighters, police, volunteers,
- 11 different government agencies like DMAT. The disaster
- 12 medical assistance teams had set up shops there. The
- 13 fire department had like a supply depot inside.
- 14 And then just trying to make sense out of that,
- 15 figuring out where -- where should everything go to,
- 16 where does it really belong, because at some point,
- 17 like I said, the landlords, they wanted to get their
- 18 buildings back and, you know, fix them and (inaudible)
- 19 back (inaudible). So that was kind of the impetus for
- 20 us, to try to do it as quickly as possible.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** How about clearing out residents

- 1 from some of the other buildings that were not
- 2 necessarily damaged, but that was -- I understand there
- 3 was some major water line breaks and when the buildings
- 4 came down they just went right through the
- 5 infrastructure underground as well, so there was a lot
- of outages, power outages.
- 7 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 8 **SSG MORIARTY:** There were buildings that weren't
- 9 initially damaged but were next to buildings that had
- 10 been damaged, and when those buildings collapsed --
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: Uh-huh.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- there was some concern that
- 13 additional buildings would be -- you know, with people
- 14 still in them.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: Right. Well, when I got
- 16 there, which was in essence day four, when I was
- 17 actually in ground zero, that had all been taken care
- 18 of. You know, the main concern now was just safety of
- 19 the rescue personnel and people in the area rather than
- 20 the residents.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: The residents had pretty much been
- 2 cleared out and the zone was a lot bigger than it is
- 3 now. I mean, as our efforts, you know, took hold and
- 4 they got better control of security and, you know, kind
- 5 of systemized the, you know, the traffic patterns of
- 6 getting in and out of the zone and all that, they
- 7 started making the zone smaller as they, you know, they
- 8 were able to ascertain what was -- what was safe and
- 9 what wasn't.
- 10 And each day you would see where like this block
- 11 was now open to, you know, pedestrians only or
- 12 residents with credentials. And, you know, that's how
- 13 they kind of -- they walked it inward.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: So our main thing was we -- more the
- 16 concern of trying to clean them out so we could get the
- 17 people back rather than, you know, they had already
- 18 been evacuated. So I wasn't, you know, part of that at
- 19 all.
- 20 SSG MORIARTY: Okay. And when did you switch over
- 21 from working for Mr. Koslow?

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: Actually, it was -- to what I'm
- 2 doing now? Well, after we did the mission he said he
- 3 had some business down in D.C., which was -- I'm trying
- 4 to recollect, last Friday or Saturday prior, and --
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** So a week ago this past
- 6 (inaudible)?
- 7 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah, exactly. And then he was
- 8 either going to come back or go on another assignment,
- 9 and from I was told was he assigned elsewhere, you
- 10 know, at D.C., and that my duties were basically to,
- 11 you know, wind down the project I was working on. And
- 12 then I transitioned over to Battery Park and doing what
- 13 I'm doing now, which is, you know, special projects,
- 14 assignment.
- I kind of know a lot of, you know, (inaudible), so
- 16 they kind of put me on different things. So --
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. You were mentioning
- 18 something about a project going under, underneath the
- 19 Brooklyn Bridge?
- 20 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. There was a -- there's
- 21 actually a supply cache there that also had Naval

- 1 Militia personnel that were putting together boxes and
- 2 things so they could, you know, kind of unitize the
- 3 cargo so they were able to get it on trucks and, you
- 4 know, better able to handle it with the size forklifts
- 5 that they had.
- 6 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, on site here?
- 7 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, right -- right at the Brooklyn
- 8 Bridge here.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, okay.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: So it was kind of interesting. When
- 11 you go underneath it you see all this kind of -- this
- 12 stuff there.
- 13 SSG MORIARTY: And where was all that equipment
- 14 going?
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: Various supply caches. That was
- 16 another project we were working on with Mr. Koslow, was
- 17 to identify within the four quadrants that the fire
- 18 department set up a supply cache that had mission
- 19 essential equipment in it only, and that, you know,
- 20 equipment that could be shared between the four
- 21 quadrants rather than being transported out of the zone

- 1 and then back in.
- Non-mission critical items, such as food, dog --
- 3 you know, like dog food, diapers, all the other stuff
- 4 that people seemed to have -- somehow got into the
- 5 zone, that was brought back to pier 36 and then
- 6 processed for transportation back to some of the
- 7 donation centers, like upstate, but trying to get it
- 8 out of here because it was getting in the way.
- 9 So that was another project we were working on as
- 10 well.
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: And you continued that project when
- 12 you came back to Battery Park?
- 13 MAJ FISCHER: I wound it down after a day. We
- 14 also -- we were assisting on setting up the north
- 15 portal and south portal rehabilitation centers, which
- 16 was kind of a feeding area, rest area for the rescue
- 17 workers, firefighters and what not, a uniform change
- 18 station so they could exchange dirty coveralls for
- 19 clean.
- 20 Setting up the wash down stations because -- I'll
- 21 say it, you know, here, because we're all in the

- 1 military family. The word was we do not use any hazmat
- 2 terminology. It's clean, it's dirty. It's not, you
- 3 know, contaminated with decon.
- 4 So that was the, you know, mind set that we took
- 5 forward was that it was a hygiene issue and not that
- 6 there was any kind of decon going on. And we were
- 7 setting up showers for the firefighters.
- 8 SSG MORIARTY: Was this in -- and was this
- 9 (inaudible) --
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: They say no. They -- I mean, the
- 11 whole the thing was that there wasn't anything
- 12 particularly hazardous other than that there was
- 13 elevated levels of asbestos, and that the closer you
- 14 got to the rubble pile, you know, the more necessary it
- 15 would be to have a respirator.
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** I see an awful lot of folks that
- 17 are around here do have those respirators, the ones,
- 18 the industrial ones.
- 19 **MAJ FISCHER:** Uh-huh.
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** That the (inaudible) --
- 21 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible) cartridges, combo

- 1 cartridges, yeah. Yeah, we were helping also in
- 2 procuring those supplies, you know, and getting people
- 3 fitted up and getting them out there.
- I also worked with credentialing as well, securing
- 5 credentials for people that need to get in. A lot of
- 6 people that should be -- have gotten into the zone.
- 7 We're having problems that -- due to the confusion of,
- 8 where do I get them.
- 9 If they didn't have the proper documentation they
- 10 were being kind of shunted between pier 92 and IS 89,
- 11 and I was kind of the person that was able to shepherd
- 12 them through and (inaudible), you know, put them in the
- 13 right format and get them the credentials they needed
- 14 to get on the job and, you know, you know the
- 15 (inaudible) crews or, you know, military personnel that
- 16 needed to get access to the zone. So it was pretty
- 17 interesting.
- 18 SSG MORIARTY: Your troops now were where? What
- 19 kind of missions were they being detailed to?
- 20 MAJ FISCHER: Well, after the beginning of the
- 21 second week when we were able to get more volunteers

- 1 in, since the Naval Militia was basically working with
- 2 volunteers that joined, they were tasked with security
- 3 missions mostly, setting up checkpoints, manning
- 4 checkpoints.
- 5 Some working parties for the -- for the Naval
- 6 Militia personnel that have a construction background,
- 7 trades background, they were assigning to Governor's
- 8 Island to help rehabilitate the buildings out at
- 9 Governor's Island. That was a mission they were given.
- 10 The (inaudible) mission also.
- We were providing some assistance at the pier 36
- 12 supply facility. which is still being manned by Naval
- 13 Militia personnel.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Pier 36?
- 15 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 16 SSG MORIARTY: I was given to understand that at
- 17 some point in time --
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: Oh, and we also had liaison officers
- 19 at OEM, which we still do. We have a watch set up, you
- 20 know, as part of a joint task force, military liaison
- 21 up there at the EOC. So this goes with kind of, you

- 1 know, most of the main (inaudible), the main missions
- 2 that we have.
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: Because I've seen the Coast Guard
- 4 there.
- 5 **MAJ FISCHER:** Oh, yeah.
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: Is your desk right next to theirs
- 7 or --
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: They're across the street.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. They're there in the
- 11 transportation section.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. I understand that at some
- 13 point in time the (inaudible) is going to be pulling
- 14 out of --
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: It should have been at 1100.
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, today?
- 17 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 18 SSG MORIARTY: And that Governor's Island will be
- 19 the new --
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Billeting area.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. That's operational right now.
- 2 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, is it?
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: Yup. (Inaudible) go over there
- 4 later, just catch a ferry.
- 5 SSG MORIARTY: Okay. I talked to somebody who is
- 6 doing the ferry stuff. He was very frustrated because
- 7 he basically said that the ferry was going to the
- 8 island twice a day, at 10:00 in the morning and at
- 9 10:00 at night, and it was there for about 40 minutes.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. There's been some issues.
- 11 They're working on augmenting the ferry schedule with
- 12 additional vessels, but I haven't personally had the
- 13 opportunity to experience it.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: I just checked in, checked back in
- 16 this morning.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: So this is something that evolved
- 19 over the weekend. So they -- I know coming in here
- 20 they expected to get a better handle on the ferry
- 21 schedule to better support what we're trying to do.

- 1 **SSG MORIARTY:** Uh-huh.
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: And you're right. (Inaudible) the
- 3 frustration of someone coming off ship, wants to come
- 4 back here or go out there, and hanging around for an
- 5 hour or two and they're not able to get transportation
- 6 over there so --
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** Well, basically we were told that
- 8 if you missed the ferry, because it's there for an
- 9 hour, if you miss the ferry you wait 12 hours for the
- 10 next one.
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: There's a -- well, it depends on who
- 12 you talk to. I've also heard there's some vessels
- 13 available out of pier 5, which is New York Waterways so
- 14 --
- 15 **SSG MORIARTY:** You mean government vessels?
- 16 MAJ FISCHER: Well, it's just a New York City
- 17 asset.
- 18 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 19 MAJ FISCHER: I (inaudible) -- so there's a couple
- 20 of ways to approach it I guess.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. We'll just wait here a

- 1 second for the helicopter. It's amazing, we filter out
- 2 all these things when we're talking. I'm sure you
- 3 (inaudible).
- 4 (Interruption to proceeding.)
- 5 **MAJ FISCHER:** (Inaudible.)
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: So after -- after Mr. Koslow left
- 7 you wound down those operations, you came over here and
- 8 you started what, do you -- doing (inaudible)?
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: Watch -- yeah, watch officer and
- 10 also, you know, on demand as the commander deemed
- 11 necessary for me to get involved in those things, you
- 12 know if he needed some (inaudible) power to (inaudible)
- 13 something that.
- 14 Like I say, this kind of -- (inaudible) this type
- 15 of assignment -- you know, I'm not one of the F staff
- 16 so I'm trained in, you know PLO and things like that,
- 17 you know. They want to kind of keep me available to
- 18 interface with different things --
- 19 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** -- as they come up.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** How did you get your orders? You

- 1 didn't -- obviously you didn't get an order to come
- 2 down. You just came down.
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: I got a verbal -- no, I got a verbal
- 4 from the --
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, did you?
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: -- deputy, the Naval Militia, GEN
- 7 Wolfe, BG Wolfe.
- 8 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: I called him from North Carolina and
- 10 said, "You know, are you standing up?"
- 11 He said, "Yes, we are." I told him I'd call him
- 12 as soon as I got close to the city, once I had my gear
- 13 and everything, which I did.
- 14 And then he told me to go to the police academy
- 15 and report there.
- 16 SSG MORIARTY: So you never went home? You just
- 17 drove --
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: Well, I did. I was home for two
- 19 hours. (Inaudible), slept for two hours, got up,
- 20 dropped the car off at the airport, went to the drill
- 21 center, (inaudible) gear, and then took off so --

- 1 SSG MORIARTY: And where's your drill center?
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: I also work up at -- I have an
- 3 affiliation with a unit up in Londonberry, New
- 4 Hampshire.
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, okay. With National Guard or
- 6 --
- 7 MAJ FISCHER: It's a Marine rifle company, a
- 8 reserve rifle company so --
- 9 SSG MORIARTY: Oh, okay. Okay, so you keep gear
- 10 there?
- 11 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 12 SSG MORIARTY: And did they have people already at
- 13 (inaudible)?
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, they actually had -- they have
- 15 full-time active duty types.
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** And they went on 724 alert?
- 17 MAJ FISCHER: I don't know about that time, but
- 18 they were -- there was somebody there that morning
- 19 because it was a weekday. So I just came in and told
- 20 them what I was doing. They said -- you know, I told
- 21 them I needed some gear. They said take it.

- 1 SSG MORIARTY: Did you take a government vehicle
- 2 also?
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: No, I POD'd it.
- 4 SSG MORIARTY: Oh, okay. Oh, so the vehicle that
- 5 you dropped off was a rental?
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah. Because I couldn't fly
- 7 home. So I did about a thousand miles in about 14
- 8 hours.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Good golly.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. I mean, you've got to
- 11 (inaudible) -- it just, you know --
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** You were at the company
- 13 headquarters so you said, hey --
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. See you, you know, and they
- 15 said, yeah, by all means.
- 16 SSG MORIARTY: Has there been a strong chain of
- 17 command (inaudible)? Are you getting (inaudible) and
- 18 updated information through your (inaudible) here or,
- 19 you know --
- 20 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah, it's pretty, pretty
- 21 much delineated now. I mean, you know, what we've been

- 1 working with is the change over from like, I think what
- 2 was it, 53rd to the 42nd.
- 3 You know, we're actually organized under the
- 4 aviation brigade, the Naval Militia is as a whole. So,
- 5 you know, everything runs through 42nd.
- So, you know, we're getting used to their staffing
- 7 and who their players are and they're getting used to
- 8 us as well.
- 9 SSG MORIARTY: You have folks up there at the 7th
- 10 regiment?
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: Correct.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 13 MAJ FISCHER: Correct. And they're, you know --
- 14 so I think all in all, though, it's gone pretty well.
- 15 I know the -- you know, GEN Cartulo (phonetic) and
- 16 folks have been very complimentary about what the Naval
- 17 Militia has done. So I think we're integrating pretty
- 18 well. And that's also with the Air National Guard as
- 19 well.
- 20 So there's been, like I say, a learning curve, but
- 21 everyone has got their missions and they're executing.

- 1 So I think all in all, if you want to look at it from a
- 2 joint National Guard type operation, it's been pretty
- 3 good. You know, just little glitches that, you know,
- 4 are the day-to-day thing that you've got to, you know,
- 5 work on overcoming.
- 6 **SSG MORIARTY:** Were you armed at all? Were you
- 7 armed at all?
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: I brought a K-bar, which after about
- 9 the second week they said, oh, you don't need that
- 10 anymore. Put it away. So --
- 11 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: But right now I've got my
- 13 leatherman. That's what I'm carrying. It's not --
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** I was told to put mine away too.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah, I didn't draw a sidearm
- 16 but, you know, I figured, you know, you wouldn't be
- 17 able to carry it anyway, which is kind of what happened
- 18 so --
- 19 **SSG MORIARTY:** Well, from what we understand some
- 20 of the -- initially when some of the infantry people
- 21 came in the soldiers and NCOs didn't have it but the

- 1 officers did have (inaudible) weapons with ammunition,
- 2 which is surprising. But they were given pretty strict
- 3 rules of engagement type of thing.
- 4 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 5 SSG MORIARTY: And I'm assuming because we're not
- 6 armed, were there rules of engagement at all issued to
- 7 you?
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: Not to me personally. I know they --
- 9 you know, these sentries are briefed on how to properly
- 10 interact with the populace, you know, and, you know,
- 11 basically to minimize any interaction. You know, we --
- 12 you know, we've had some -- one case here of -- where
- 13 we had to, you know, implement immediate response.
- We had a civilian that got ill on a bus right
- 15 outside of here that we were asked to render
- 16 assistance.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** That became ill?
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, ill on the bus. The bus
- 19 driver stopped, saw us, ran to us to say I have an ill
- 20 passenger. They didn't know if he was having a heart
- 21 attack or what.

- 1 SSG MORIARTY: You had -- you had medics here?
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. And that we ran -- we went
- 3 there. I became, I guess, the ranking officer on the
- 4 scene. I checked to see if NYPD was notified. They
- 5 were. EMS was on its way.
- I looked at the passenger. I told them don't
- 7 render -- right now he doesn't need assistance. It's
- 8 just observant, which they did.
- 9 And then when EMS came we retreated and turned the
- 10 scene over to the police and EMTs, which was the proper
- 11 procedure. So, you know, the bus driver thanked us
- 12 for, you know, helping him.
- 13 So we did have a positive experience there, but
- 14 you have to be careful in how far you go. You know,
- 15 there's -- that's the kind of thing that, you know,
- 16 immediate response indicates a particular life
- 17 threatening situation be relinquished to the
- 18 appropriate civilian authority once they have control
- 19 of the scene.
- 20 So it actually worked out pretty well. But it was
- 21 kind of, you know, a frantic moment or two trying to

- 1 figure out, you know, what was wrong with this
- 2 gentleman. He did not look very well, but after about
- 3 20 minutes, they worked him, and I was told he ended up
- 4 walking off the bus so --
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Well, excellent.
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. It was a plus for us, you
- 7 know.
- 8 SSG MORIARTY: Was it a heart attack or
- 9 indigestion?
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. What I -- what I was told was
- 11 two things. He had been on strong antibiotics for a
- 12 few weeks and just stopped taking them, and that it was
- 13 a reaction --
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: -- or it was food poisoning. But
- 16 they determined that --
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: -- he didn't have a heart attack,
- 19 which was good.
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 21 **MAJ FISCHER:** You have to be prepared for anything

- 1 in New York I guess.
- 2 **SSG MORIARTY:** Did you -- (inaudible)
- 3 mobilization? Do you do drills periodically like this?
- 4 Are all of your, you know, power of attorney, and
- 5 wills, and shot records, and all that stuff scrutinized
- 6 in any particular --
- 7 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, mine were, back when I -- I
- 8 came back into, you know, a drilling unit. The first
- 9 thing the corpsman did was riddle me full of needles.
- 10 So I'm good to go. I think I've got one more booster
- 11 shot and like my shot card is filled.
- 12 So, you know -- which is interesting because I
- 13 have my letter in for retirement so --
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** (Inaudible.)
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: -- (inaudible) months left.
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, is that it?
- 17 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Well, it would have been, but
- 18 who knows --
- 19 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah. Yeah.
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** -- with what just happened. But --
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah, that's true.

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: -- he said it doesn't matter, sir.
- 2 You don't know what's going to happen, which is kind of
- 3 interesting. He pumps me up full of all this stuff and
- 4 the next thing you know I'm down here so --
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** When did that happen?
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: I think he finally -- they finally
- 7 tracked me down when they reviewed my medical record
- 8 about six months ago.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: So, you know, I got my DNA testing,
- 11 you know, the TB, the -- you know, you name it, tetanus
- 12 boosters.
- 13 **SSG MORIARTY:** Well, we were -- we were notified,
- 14 put on alert status, so it kind of -- from the Center
- 15 for Military History the week after it happened. And
- 16 so (inaudible) you know, we (inaudible) -- we were just
- 17 twisting in the breeze, waiting, waiting to get orders.
- 18 And we finally got to the point where we couldn't
- 19 stand it any more so we -- we just told our employers
- 20 that, hey, we've been activated.
- 21 And we started going to the drill center and

- 1 getting all of our equipment packed, and then we were
- 2 supposed to get notification, official notification,
- 3 orders a week from -- a week ago from this past Friday.
- 4 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 5 SSG MORIARTY: So it was two Fridays ago. So that
- 6 Thursday we all, you know, showed up in uniform, loaded
- 7 all of our gear up. We went up to Reading, where we
- 8 were going to depart from, and they said, well we --
- 9 you haven't got orders, but what's holding them up now
- 10 is you need shots.
- 11 So they sent us down to Hanscom (phonetic) Air
- 12 Base and we got -- everybody got -- the Hepatitis B was
- 13 the first shot. Then you get the second shot in 30
- 14 days.
- 15 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 16 SSG MORIARTY: This would be just about
- 17 (inaudible) the time we're into this we'll get the next
- 18 shot, and then in six months you get the third one.
- 19 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** But the other thing that they were
- 21 giving everybody was tetanus shots, and I just got --

- 1 my dog and another dog in the neighborhood got into a
- 2 fight about a year ago, and I was stupid enough to
- 3 stick my hand down, grab my dog's collar, and I came
- 4 back up with two, two good size gashes, and each
- 5 required six sutures.
- 6 **MAJ FISCHER:** Ooh.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** The first thing they do is give you
- 8 a tetanus shot. And I'm (inaudible) my scars -- and as
- 9 I'm doing this she's -- the nurse, she's sticking the
- 10 tetanus shot in my arm. And I said, "I don't need
- 11 that."
- 12 And she said, "You already had it. You've already
- 13 got it."
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Too late.
- 15 **SSG MORIARTY:** It was too late. And I had brought
- 16 my -- as a matter of fact it's right here. I don't go
- 17 anywhere without my yellow international immunization
- 18 thing here, and unfortunately when I went to get my arm
- 19 fixed (inaudible) with the dog, I forgot to bring it,
- 20 otherwise I wouldn't have had to get a tetanus shot. I
- 21 hate shots.

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. I just look the other way.
- 2 SSG MORIARTY: I looked the other way (inaudible).
- 3 Okay.
- 4 So you -- you came into this unit just six months
- 5 ago?
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: No, I've been a member since 1990.
- 7 SSG MORIARTY: But they just caught up to your
- 8 records, your (inaudible) --
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: Oh, the Marine unit, two years.
- 10 Yeah, it took them awhile to track me down, but the
- 11 Naval Militia I've been since like just prior to Desert
- 12 Storm so --
- 13 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, okay. So you were activated
- 14 out of the Naval Militia?
- 15 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** To the Marines (inaudible)?
- 17 MAJ FISCHER: No, it's the other way around. We
- 18 -- we're Marines, you know, in the units, but the Naval
- 19 Militia is a volunteer organization. So we --
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, okay. I'm confused.
- 21 **MAJ FISCHER:** That's all right. It's made up of

- 1 different units, all right. I also have an affiliation
- 2 within the state as well so --
- 3 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 4 MAJ FISCHER: -- that's how -- you know, I'm a
- 5 special staff officer because I was trained in NBC and
- 6 (inaudible) response stuff and there's not too many
- 7 people that have that experience.
- 8 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: So they -- they -- when stuff like
- 10 this goes up, they said, hey, you know, can you help us
- 11 out.
- 12 SSG MORIARTY: Okay. So when stuff in the future
- 13 goes up --
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. You know --
- 15 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- they want somebody out there
- 16 checking here and doing all that good stuff?
- 17 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, if they need it. Yeah, I
- 18 mean, I could provide the training. I mean, I've got
- 19 the MOS to provide that, you know. It's been a while
- 20 since I've done it. You know, just like anything else
- 21 but -- it's like a bicycle.

- 1 So I pulled all my SOPs and everything for NBC and
- 2 (inaudible) preparedness, liaison and officer stuff.
- 3 So --
- 4 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 5 MAJ FISCHER: -- these books themselves are a
- 6 weapons system --
- 7 (Interruption to proceeding.)
- 8 SSG MORIARTY: Did you have a com plan, a
- 9 communication plan?
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: For the Naval Militia? Not one that
- 11 was, you know, brought (inaudible), other than what was
- 12 basically briefed at the JTF. I mean, we formulated a
- 13 comp plan based upon the organizational (inaudible)
- 14 that were, you know, we were given.
- So that's being lashed up. But, you know, they
- 16 have one in place now. But the first two days it was a
- 17 matter of, you know, who are you. You know, what are
- 18 you doing, okay? Well, then, what mix do you
- 19 (inaudible) part of?
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** Sure.
- 21 MAJ FISCHER: And, you know -- because like I

- 1 said, we're not organic to this, you know, to the 42nd
- 2 or the 53rd, so we kind of had to come -- you know,
- 3 they had to figure out like how to plug us in and then
- 4 it went from there.
- But, you know, we've had coms with all our
- 6 sentries, you know, all our posts. That was one thing
- 7 that we, you know, we were probably the first do. We
- 8 made sure everyone had (inaudible) from coms back to
- 9 the COC. You know, we were able to keep track of our
- 10 (inaudible) --
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: That's (inaudible) --
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, all the checkpoints that we
- 13 were responsible for manning.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Okay. These are boilerplate
- 15 questions we sort of came up with --
- 16 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible.)
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- and I (inaudible) some of them.
- 18 And obviously this one I have to adjust.
- 19 So what -- what was the overall mission then of
- 20 the Naval Militia in a such situation such as this?
- 21 MAJ FISCHER: Well, once again, this is kind of a

- 1 unique situation that, you know, standing up as many
- 2 members as we have this past few weeks, working with
- 3 the National Guard directly, you know, and being I
- 4 guess brought under the cognizance of the 42nd was a
- 5 different perspective as well. So what -- what we were
- 6 tasked with, I guess that the first -- because there
- 7 wasn't a lot of us, was basically working, you know,
- 8 like working in OEM as liaisons, standing up a watch,
- 9 tracking Naval Militia people as they reported in,
- 10 putting the calls out, getting the Naval Militia
- 11 people, you know, arranging for their arrival, in-
- 12 processing billeting, you know, standing (inaudible) up
- 13 so, you know, it had some (inaudible) to it that would
- 14 be of use to, you know, to the commander.
- 15 Once that was achieved then we were tasked out
- 16 with providing essentially, as I said, Governor's --
- 17 security for various locations in the zone and outside
- 18 the zone. Governor's Island, you know, with --
- 19 providing construction and, you know, assets,
- 20 prioritizing, you know, and that's pretty much it.
- 21 So we had, you know, a variety of missions, but

- 1 right now it's mainly focusing in on security as -- you
- 2 know, the construction evolution is ending and what
- 3 not, and as, you know, the National Guard and the 42nd
- 4 starts bringing, you know, makes their transition and
- 5 brings more assets in as they need so --
- 6 **SSG MORIARTY:** Have you been given any (inaudible)
- 7 dates?
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: Yes. My orders read to 5 October.
- 9 The (inaudible) to extend, as many have, but
- 10 unfortunately, you know, like I said, I've been gone
- 11 from my business since the 10th. I'm a general manager
- 12 reporting, you know, to, you know, the executive VP and
- 13 the president.
- So, you know, they figured -- they're glad I'm
- 15 here but, you know --
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 17 **MAJ FISCHER:** -- (inaudible) a little bit more
- 18 people anyway so, you know. I mean, I think my
- 19 importance simply was my ability to be able to just get
- 20 it here as quick as I was able to because that's when
- 21 they needed people, and as the crawl up is progressing

- 1 and they're, you know, getting a better fix on people
- 2 and getting them, rotating them in here, you know, I'm
- 3 more, you know, I guess better able to allow myself to
- 4 move on and go back to the civilian sector.
- But, you know, once again, if they say, hey,
- 6 something has come up. We need you. You know, I'm
- 7 more than willing to come back because, you know, once
- 8 again, I can't believe that this has occurred and I'm
- 9 like everyone else. It's our country and you've got to
- 10 do, you know, what you have to do to make this thing as
- 11 -- try to fix it as best we can. We'll never be able
- 12 to --
- 13 **SSG MORIARTY:** Put the genie back in the lamp.
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, exactly. Yeah, I mean,
- 15 everything is changed but we have to move forward and
- 16 proceed with the mission. So, you know, that's kind of
- 17 what it's all about.
- 18 **SSG MORIARTY:** Now, how about the unit? Is the
- 19 unit going to be here indefinitely or --
- 20 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. They're looking if they can
- 21 extend people and, you know, keep things going they

- 1 will. I don't know with the extension, how many more
- 2 bodies they're able to get and how many they have left.
- I know some people were here for a week, some for
- 4 two. I'm working on my third week. You know, they
- 5 said, hey, can you do another couple, but once again,
- 6 like I said, my company has been very generous. You
- 7 know, no questions asked, you know.
- 8 Like I said, unless there's a (inaudible) --
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: -- and a hard fast, you know, hey,
- 11 you know, Fischer we need you.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** And there may be a more critical
- 13 need in the future, some other --
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: Exactly. So --
- 15 **SSG MORIARTY:** (Inaudible.)
- 16 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, I might as well get back, you
- 17 know, in the swing, and if the balloon goes up again,
- 18 you know, I'll be ready to mount out again. But, you
- 19 know, you've got to kind of -- you know (inaudible)
- 20 what it is.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah. Yeah. (Inaudible.)

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible.)
- 2 **SSG MORIARTY:** With the Marines?
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, because (inaudible) federal
- 4 activation there's a very, you know, strong
- 5 possibility. What the mission might be, I don't know.
- 6 I mean, they're talking homeland defense. It could be
- 7 that they get, you know, (inaudible) out.
- 8 You know, being a rifle company I think they would
- 9 try to hold them back to put into maybe an active duty
- 10 situation or something, you know, on the other side of
- 11 the water. You know, Marine Corps has that tip of the
- 12 spear mission and that's something that, you know, the
- 13 Marines would, you know, probably hold those assets
- 14 for.
- But, you know, once again, depending upon how
- 16 critical it is and how things are tasked, you know.
- 17 anything is a possibility.
- 18 **SSG MORIARTY:** (Inaudible) how many times they're
- 19 going across.
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Uh-huh. Exactly.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Because it sounds like there's

- 1 going to be several, several spears being thrown.
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah, it's going to be a
- 3 multi-front operation I think so --
- 4 SSG MORIARTY: Yeah. And it's so funny, too,
- 5 because I kept on hearing that the Army was going to
- 6 reduce to six divisions. You know, that they had
- 7 abandoned the docking of the (inaudible) to --
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: Major theater, yeah.
- 9 SSG MORIARTY: Yeah. And that they were going to
- 10 one major theater for the (inaudible) action. Then all
- 11 of a sudden, you know, it's like somebody came and
- 12 kicked sand in their face.
- 13 (Inaudible) do you think of that whole process?
- 14 MAJ FISCHER: You know, it always happens. It's
- 15 -- you know, we always draw down. You know -- you know
- 16 you draw down after World War II and then you get
- 17 Korea. You draw down after Korea you get Vietnam. It
- 18 seems just as we're ready to pull the plug on something
- 19 something (inaudible) like this thing and, you know, I
- 20 don't know.
- I mean, I think you've learned your lesson. You

- 1 know, you cut back on defense, you cut back on
- 2 personnel and then you need them so --
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: You know it --
- 4 MAJ FISCHER: Like Governor's Island, right,
- 5 you're standing that back up.
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: It goes -- this goes all the way
- 7 back -- we just did a (inaudible) for Lexington
- 8 (inaudible) in our area. You know the --
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible.)
- 10 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- (inaudible) from the (inaudible)
- 11 point of view. And one of the reasons that (inaudible)
- 12 soldiers were over here was because they didn't want
- 13 (inaudible) in England. Their nobles and the gentry
- 14 (inaudible) else felt threatened when the king had that
- 15 many soldiers in uniform at one time. And so they did
- 16 the same thing. This is about the 16 or 1700's.
- 17 You know, after you got done with a war, you just
- 18 fired your troops. They'd go back to the fields. And
- 19 it's funny that, you know, even though we don't have a
- 20 king anymore, our gentry in Washington feel very
- 21 uncomfortable with having a large standing army. Okay.

- 1 That's -- (inaudible).
- 2 Is there anything you want to add to this
- 3 interview? Is there anything that I haven't touched
- 4 upon that I probably should have or anything you want
- 5 to contribute that --
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: No, I think -- I think we, you know,
- 7 pretty much hit all the major, you know, I guess things
- 8 that I've seen.
- 9 I could add that I've worked very closely some,
- 10 you know, police and fire personnel. You know, I ran
- 11 into my old battalion commander from Desert Storm, COL
- 12 Blatch (phonetic) who's a fire chief and --
- 13 SSG MORIARTY: What was he? Was he at ground
- 14 zero?
- 15 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, he was at -- at the, I think
- 16 what they call the command (inaudible) pen, which was I
- 17 think down by (inaudible) and West Streets and, you
- 18 know, it was kind of like one of those interesting
- 19 things where you're in the middle of this thing and all
- of a sudden you see, you know, someone that you hadn't
- 21 seen in ten years, you know, come walking into the

- 1 meeting room that you have, you know, right across from
- 2 the -- from the, you know, the school.
- 3 And there was -- it was very nice to see everyone
- 4 working together, not only, you know, the New Yorkers
- 5 themselves, but I mean I was working with Teamsters
- 6 that were assigned to us by OEM to help put up GT tents
- 7 down in the zone, and the amount of, you know, effort
- 8 that everyone put together into making it happen,
- 9 working together. I mean, I've worked with LAPD cops
- 10 that came in. That was part of that, that mission I
- 11 had with that Chris Koslow.
- 12 And it's people you're going to probably stay in
- 13 touch with the rest of your life. I mean, it's
- 14 incredible.
- 15 You know, the other thing is -- and I saw
- 16 President Bush and they were flying -- when he came by
- 17 he gave us the thumbs up when we came out of the zone.
- I guess the most striking thing for me was
- 19 watching and seeing F-16's fly combat air patrols over
- 20 New York City. It doesn't seem right. It seemed out
- 21 of -- you know, there's the President of the United

- 1 States and they're you're -- we were watching F-16's
- 2 just criss-crossing the skies for combat air patrol,
- 3 and then standing in that in devastation, looking
- 4 around. You know, it looked like a tactical nuke hit
- 5 and, you know, that's really it.
- 6 It -- I don't think you fully process it. I mean,
- 7 it's just seeping in a little bit at a time. But, you
- 8 know, the enormity and the magnitude of it is still
- 9 incredible, and I guess the main thing is, you know, I
- 10 feel sad for the victims and their families, and listen
- 11 to the stories of the police. I mean, they'd sit in
- 12 here and say, hey, you know, I lost a brother.
- 13 I met a former Marine that had lost two sons. He
- 14 was in the fire department and, you know, the guy was
- on the job working. You know, all he said to me was,
- 16 "I hope you get him."
- 17 And, you know, these are the kind of stories that
- 18 I'll always take away and have imbedded in my memory.
- 19 So that's about it. It's a tragedy.
- 20 You know, it's something that I think this country
- 21 I think will -- I think it will make the world a better

- 1 place for it. I think that's really what should come
- 2 out of this, the memory of the people that died.
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: So it doesn't happen again.
- 4 MAJ FISCHER: Exactly. You know, it's got to be
- 5 (inaudible) -- the end of this, you know. That's
- 6 really, you know, kind of why I'm here, just to do my
- 7 small part.
- 8 You know, I think I would be throwing things
- 9 through the TV set if I had stayed home, and I wasn't
- 10 going to wait (inaudible) just a piece of paper to come
- 11 from wherever. You know, I (inaudible) -- I got a
- 12 verbal, I came in, you know, just to do what I had to
- 13 do.
- 14 You know, whether or not the orders ever caught
- 15 up, I don't care. You know, it's not a matter of
- 16 whether I got paid or not. It's just that I had to do
- 17 what I had to do.
- 18 So I think that's what a lot of the people in the
- 19 Militia, the Naval Militia and the National Guard felt.
- 20 I wasn't going to wait for someone to call me to say
- 21 (inaudible) no go.

- 1 You know, just like yourself, I was -- hey, I
- 2 drove a thousand miles, 14 hours, grabbed my stuff, got
- 3 down here. All right, what can I do to, you know,
- 4 straighten, you know, do what I can to help straighten
- 5 this out and, you know, put the city -- you know,
- 6 because I was born here, I went to school here.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** Oh, did you?
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah, I want to Fordham up in
- 9 the Bronx and, you know, it's -- my family is all here.
- 10 My brother watched it from across the river, watched
- 11 the whole thing, and so it hit him, you know.
- 12 And never mind the stories I head of people
- 13 watching it from -- the two planes hit, the people
- 14 falling out the windows and all that. I mean, these
- 15 are the stories that you hear.
- You know, so whatever we can do it's just a small
- 17 measure --
- 18 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 19 MAJ FISCHER: -- of what we hope to accomplish.
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** And (inaudible) computer to
- 21 (inaudible) to a store yesterday. He tried to get it

- 1 fixed because, you know, the power supply is all shot.
- 2 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: And the guy's looking at him and he
- 4 says, boy this is an old, you know, computer. It's a
- 5 laptop. And they said, you know, that it's -- it's
- 6 (inaudible) because we (inaudible) deployed to Bosnia
- 7 and he had it there for (inaudible), and finally he got
- 8 killed on the World Trade mission.
- 9 And the guy started sobbing. His office
- 10 (inaudible) across the street. And when he came out to
- 11 see what was going on, that's when the people had
- 12 started jumping out the window because of the flames,
- 13 the fire. And people were burning, you know, as they
- 14 came down. You know, the wind actually -- the terminal
- 15 velocity or the wind actually snuffed out the flames.
- And this guy just broke down. I mean, and we
- 17 weren't -- we weren't there doing our history thing,
- 18 you know, because we have a computer (inaudible).
- 19 (Inaudible) one of the guys who was in building 7 and
- 20 they were doing an emergency reading, and because of
- 21 what happened next to them when they were told to get

- 1 out of that building, I mean they had just evacuated
- 2 and I think it was when the first tower collapsed.
- 3 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 4 SSG MORIARTY: I mean there was -- from my small
- 5 town in western Massachusetts, 40,000 people, we had
- 6 one person on (inaudible). It was the superintendent
- 7 of the school's daughter. She lived in Worcester,
- 8 about (inaudible) she grew up (inaudible). And we had
- 9 two guys from our community that were --
- 10 (End side A, tape 1.)
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: And (inaudible) was what I had to
- 12 do. So what I mean is that I can't -- I don't think
- 13 anybody in the country has not been affected. And it's
- 14 -- you didn't have to be witness to this horror.
- But like you, obviously, you know, you were
- 16 trudging through (inaudible) and mud and that stuff
- 17 over there. It's just -- it's going to be a scar on
- 18 our national psyche for a while.
- 19 MAJ FISCHER: Oh, yeah. (Inaudible) is the, you
- 20 know, the toll it's going to take just on, like I said,
- 21 just on the survivors and the people that, you know,

- 1 witnessed it. I mean you're talking probably hundreds
- 2 of thousands of people that saw this live, you know,
- 3 (inaudible) here that are going to have to, you know,
- 4 somehow deal with that trauma.
- 5 And, you know -- I know I haven't seen anything
- 6 compared to what they did at all, and it bothers me to
- 7 where, you know, I can't believe it. I have a problem,
- 8 like sometimes I'll just wake up in the middle night
- 9 just --
- 10 **SSG MORIARTY:** Doing the denial?
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah, just like, you know, for the
- 12 first week that's what I was doing because I couldn't
- 13 believe I was actually in New York City working this
- 14 thing. You know, I lost perspective of where I was. I
- 15 was on the ships or I was sleeping in, you know, a
- 16 basement of a courthouse or whatever it is.
- 17 I just kept -- all of a sudden I just jerk awake
- 18 and have to figure out that, yeah, this is real. That,
- 19 you know, you really are asleep in the courthouse, or
- 20 on a ship, or in the EOC, or wherever, you know, or
- 21 inside that classroom down at ground zero. You know,

- 1 it's real.
- 2 So it took me about a week before I, you know, I
- 3 stopped doing that. So, you know, and that's just --
- 4 SSG MORIARTY: When you went home, besides talking
- 5 to your wife, did you talk with, you know, a priest or
- 6 a minister or anything like that?
- 7 MAJ FISCHER: No, it's -- you know, I mean, like I
- 8 said, I mean, I've been lucky in that, you know, any of
- 9 my business I've had in ground zero, whether, you know,
- 10 the recons or the walk throughs, I haven't, you know,
- 11 chanced upon anything, you know. I mean, I'm not there
- 12 to -- I'm doing my job. If it entails I go into
- 13 somewhere or, you know, if they tell me, you know,
- 14 you've got to do this, and then something, you know,
- 15 you come across something, fine, but I'm not there to,
- 16 you know -- if I can avoid it, you know, I am.
- 17 And so if they tell me to do it, I do it, but I'm
- 18 not a glutton for, you know, going in there to see if
- 19 you know -- poking my head in the morgue or anything.
- 20 You know, it's -- it's not my mission and, you know,
- 21 I'll leave it to the people that they have tasked with

- 1 that.
- On the other hand, you know, I've gone into some
- 3 places where you don't know what you were going to
- 4 find. So, you know, it's -- especially the first
- 5 couple of days.
- 6 I've been fortunate in that regard. You know, I
- 7 haven't had to deal with anything, you know, that --
- 8 like some of these other rescuers have had to deal
- 9 with. But just looking at the -- just knowing that
- 10 people are in there.
- 11 I know I picked up a piece of rubble when I was
- 12 there (inaudible). The guy I was with, he took us by
- 13 the (inaudible) to look at something and, you know, I'm
- 14 taking notes of whatever he's yelling and stuff at me.
- 15 The rubble was maybe no bigger than the size of your
- 16 hand. That's like the biggest of it. It's pulverized.
- 17 And when you pick it up you can still smell the jet
- 18 fuel and (inaudible). It looks like a charcoal
- 19 briquet.
- 20 **SSG MORIARTY:** Really.
- 21 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. It was all black and charred.

- 1 You could smell the JP-4 or JP-5, whatever they used.
- 2 It was impregnated within the rubble, you know. And
- 3 it just gave -- it gave me the creeps.
- 4 SSG MORIARTY: Well, that's one of the reasons
- 5 (inaudible) because they were so loaded with fuel.
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Oh, yeah, I mean, they had
- 7 this thing planned out. You know it's -- and I guess
- 8 they were insane geniuses as (inaudible) if that's what
- 9 you want to call it.
- 10 And I (inaudible) understand that, you know, the
- 11 Koran does not teach this kind of stuff, or it's
- 12 nothing (inaudible) what they (inaudible), but it's
- 13 still not going to stop them. So it's a tricky
- 14 situation. You know, it's going to be hard for the
- 15 country to deal with this, I guess the situation, and
- 16 -- I don't know.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** And I don't think it's going to be
- 18 a quick fix.
- 19 MAJ FISCHER: It's a very uncertain future. A lot
- 20 of people are nervous.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** You know, I think it's going to be

- 1 one of those things that -- it's going to be an on-
- 2 going process for years and years to come.
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. But, you know, we have to do
- 4 what we have to do and some -- a lot of people are
- 5 saying if I have to give up a few freedoms that, you
- 6 know, to take care of this thing, so be it.
- 7 SSG MORIARTY: Just as long as we don't lose our
- 8 national character.
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: That's right.
- 10 SSG MORIARTY: You know, the things that have made
- 11 us great.
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: That's right. You know, it's
- 13 something that I guess, you know, you have to consider,
- 14 but as long as we focus on supporting the military,
- 15 supporting, you know, the institutions at home that,
- 16 you know, are going to be on the front lines to wage
- 17 the war against terrorism, that's the main thing, you
- 18 know.
- 19 And I think the American public will -- will --
- 20 they're in it for the long haul. I get that sense, you
- 21 know.

- 1 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 2 MAJ FISCHER: So I think so far, you know, so
- 3 good. It's -- I think they're getting intel, they're
- 4 getting, you know, getting troops on the ground. I
- 5 think they're putting stuff in place so when they do
- 6 light the fuse that they hit him hard and they hit the
- 7 right spot.
- 8 So I'm confident that even though it seems like
- 9 it's a taking a while to get in place, I think they're
- 10 doing it the right way.
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: Well, you were in Desert Storm.
- 12 You knew that they were -- they built it for that.
- 13 **MAJ FISCHER:** For what, four months?
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 15 **MAJ FISCHER:** Before the actual --
- 16 **SSG MORIARTY:** (Inaudible.)
- 17 **MAJ FISCHER:** -- (inaudible) until (inaudible)
- 18 hour, yeah.
- 19 **SSG MORIARTY:** You know -- so I mean everybody is
- 20 staying low. They did it so fast in Desert Storm.
- 21 Well, that's because --

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: They had Desert Shield --
- 2 SSG MORIARTY: Right.
- 3 MAJ FISCHER: -- which was basically a defensive
- 4 build up --
- 5 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 6 MAJ FISCHER: -- until they got enough offensive
- 7 power to --
- 8 **SSG MORIARTY:** Right.
- 9 MAJ FISCHER: -- (inaudible) out.
- 10 **SSG MORIARTY:** And there's some -- unfortunately
- 11 you don't have a concentrated target. You know, it's
- 12 not like you have an Army sitting there where you can
- 13 draw a line in the sand and say, okay, we're going to
- 14 build our Army over here and we're going to attack
- 15 them.
- 16 MAJ FISCHER: Right. No, this is -- this is not
- 17 your basic military, classic, you know, warfare
- 18 situation. It's that, you know, stuff they always
- 19 thought about it -- you know, I guess a low level
- 20 (inaudible) conflict.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** Low intensity, yeah.

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: You know, but --
- 2 **SSG MORIARTY:** Yeah. I started reading Black Hawk
- 3 Down. It's -- you know, I bring a military book with
- 4 me every time I go on one of these missions. That's
- 5 the one I brought this time. And it's funny, too,
- 6 because I think a lot of those same players that were
- 7 in Mogadishu are going to be -- you know it's the
- 8 (inaudible), it's the Delta, it's the Ranger. They're
- 9 going to be the front line players in the Marine Corps
- 10 --
- 11 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 12 SSG MORIARTY: -- in this one here.
- 13 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. And then the great thing I
- 14 think is you're not going to see a lot of, I think,
- 15 joint service rivalry or any of that stuff. I think
- 16 everyone is going to be, you know, working well
- 17 together.
- 18 You can see it here. I mean, it's -- you know,
- 19 all the Army commanders I have had the privilege to
- 20 meet have been very hospitable and, you know, willing
- 21 to, you know, work with everyone to, you know, make it

- 1 a maximum effort. And, you know, there's no rice bowls
- 2 or anything that I've seen.
- 3 So, you know, it's -- you know, I think it's good
- 4 because everyone is here for the -- you know, to get
- 5 the job done the right way.
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: Well, I think we've just --
- 7 (inaudible) here (inaudible) even the military, to all,
- 8 all the agencies. I'm amazed at the lack of
- 9 competition.
- 10 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 11 **SSG MORIARTY:** Outside of the hotel where we're
- 12 billeted there's a synagogue, and there was a funeral
- 13 there yesterday, and they had -- a fire, a fireman's
- 14 funeral. They had the fire trucks and the platform
- 15 trucks --
- 16 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** -- with the platform raised and the
- 18 flag hanging down from it. You know, there was two of
- 19 those there, one on either side of the synagogue, and I
- 20 watched the interaction between the police officers and
- 21 all the firefighters who we were assembling, you know,

- 1 (inaudible).
- 2 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: And -- because normally there is a
- 4 little bit of rivalry there, you know if nothing else
- 5 the (inaudible).
- 6 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 7 SSG MORIARTY: You know, the cops (inaudible), the
- 8 firefighters, you know, all they do is they hang around
- 9 their stations and sleep and they get all the equipment
- 10 and vice a versa. That's how it is in my (inaudible).
- 11 MAJ FISCHER: Well, it's the (inaudible) DNY and
- 12 the PDA, and the NYPD, they clash. Who's got control
- 13 of the situation. Is it a fire scene, is it a crime
- 14 scene. I mean, I've heard it. I've worked with both
- 15 of them.
- 16 SSG MORIARTY: Yeah, but I have not seen that, and
- 17 yesterday when I was watching the (inaudible) it was
- 18 just (inaudible) the international brotherhood has been
- 19 expanded. You know what I'm saying?
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yes.
- 21 **SSG MORIARTY:** It's --

- 1 MAJ FISCHER: I was working with Teamsters and
- 2 stuff, you know, and those guys are usually, you know,
- 3 giving you this stuff. But they were like, hey,
- 4 whatever you need, whatever you want, you know, we're
- 5 here.
- I mean, you know, they had their hard hats on,
- 7 local whatever, the American flag on the back, and I'll
- 8 tell you, you know, I would have taken these guys into
- 9 combat any time. I mean, they were -- you know,
- 10 (inaudible) --
- 11 **SSG MORIARTY:** (Inaudible.)
- 12 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. They're -- you know, they
- 13 were pretty hard, but it was good just to -- hey,
- 14 major, what do you need. You know, we're here to --
- 15 they had trucks, they had people, you know.
- And like I said, it's amazing how quickly this
- 17 city can pull together and -- you know, if that's one
- 18 of the lasting reminders of what occurred here, you
- 19 know, maybe that wouldn't be such a bad thing. I think
- 20 New York gets a bum rap anyway.
- 21 You know, if you really know the people they're

- 1 not that bad. They're actually fairly, fairly
- 2 friendly, but you just got to get to know them.
- 3 SSG MORIARTY: Well, what they do is -- there's so
- 4 much demand on their time, I think that they're very
- 5 abrupt.
- 6 **MAJ FISCHER:** Yeah.
- 7 **SSG MORIARTY:** They don't want you -- yeah, they
- 8 don't want to mess around. If you've got something to
- 9 say, say it.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: Yeah. Yeah. Time is money.
- 11 SSG MORIARTY: Well, (inaudible) but even when
- 12 it's -- they're off the job it's, you know it's a
- 13 (inaudible) talking about that earlier. It must take
- 14 (inaudible) hours. You know, three hours to get to
- 15 work, you work eight hours, and two hours to get home.
- 16 You know, so what leisure time you have afterwards is
- 17 precious.
- 18 So I can understand that, that mentality. I could
- 19 not -- I could not (inaudible) this lifestyle.
- I mean, I -- I work for an (inaudible) and I'm a
- 21 mile and a half away from the office and, you know,

- 1 even on a (inaudible), you know, just taking longer,
- 2 four or five minutes, I kind of (inaudible) to work.
- 3 And --
- 4 MAJ FISCHER: You didn't want to wait at one
- 5 traffic light?
- 6 SSG MORIARTY: I (inaudible). Seriously, there is
- 7 one traffic light that I can't avoid.
- 8 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible) no traffic light.
- 9 **SSG MORIARTY:** Well, in the snow situation, too,
- 10 it's great because that's usually my (inaudible).
- 11 Those are the biggest of my -- you know, because we
- 12 have no public transportation.
- 13 **MAJ FISCHER:** Right.
- 14 SSG MORIARTY: We have -- because my city, I use
- 15 all the (inaudible) --
- 16 **MAJ FISCHER:** Which town?
- 17 **SSG MORIARTY:** Westfield, Westfield, Mass.
- 18 MAJ FISCHER: All right.
- 19 **SSG MORIARTY:** We're outside of Springfield.
- 20 **MAJ FISCHER:** Uh-huh.
- 21 SSG MORIARTY: You know, but it's -- I'm amazed at

- 1 this place. You know, the stores are open 24 hours a
- 2 day. There's people out at 3:00 in the morning. I
- 3 couldn't sleep last night so I got up and I went down,
- 4 looked outside, and there's still people walking
- 5 around. You know that song by Sinatra, the city that
- 6 doesn't sleep, he was (inaudible) right.
- 7 (Interruption to proceeding.)
- 8 SSG MORIARTY: If you have nothing more I can
- 9 conclude.
- 10 MAJ FISCHER: I appreciate the opportunity to tell
- 11 my story.
- 12 **SSG MORIARTY:** All right.
- 13 MAJ FISCHER: (Inaudible) help.
- 14 **SSG MORIARTY:** Let me stop this. This concludes
- 15 this interview...
- 16 (The interview was concluded.)
