- 1 PROCEEDINGS
- 2 **SFC MORIARTY:** (Inaudible) and
- 3 SGT DELUCA: SGT Joseph Deluca from the 126th
- 4 Military History.
- 5 **SFC MORIARTY:** And this interview is taking place
- 6 at -- this is the North Morgue?
- 7 MSGR FRONTIERO: I'm not sure what you'd call it.
- 8 It's the only one I know.
- 9 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay. Well, there's two. There's
- 10 north and south. This is the north, right outside of
- 11 what were formerly the World Trade Center towers.
- 12 MSGR FRONTIERO: The World Financial Center.
- 13 **SFC MORIARTY:** Oh, we're right outside the World
- 14 Financial Center?
- 15 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Right.
- 16 **SFC MORIARTY:** And this interview is with
- 17 Monsignor
- 18 MSGR FRONTIERO: Anthony Frontiero.
- 19 **SFC MORIARTY:** Would you spell your name
- 20 phonetically?
- 21 MSGR FRONTIERO: F-r-o-n-t-i-e-r-o.

- 1 SFC MORIARTY: Okay. Now for the legal
- 2 disclaimer. I understand that the tape and transcripts
- 3 resulting from this oral history will belong to the
- 4 U.S. Army to be used in any manner deemed in the best
- 5 interest of the U.S. Army, as determined by the Chief
- 6 of Military History. I understand it's subject to
- 7 security classification restrictions, I will be given
- 8 an opportunity to review the resulting transcript in
- 9 order to clarify or expand my original thoughts. The
- 10 Army will provide me with a copy of the edited
- 11 transcript for my own use subject to classification
- 12 restrictions.
- Do you have any conditions you --
- 14 MSGR FRONTIERO: No.
- 15 SFC MORIARTY: And if at any point you do, we can
- 16 come back to this.
- 17 MSGR FRONTIERO: Oh, yes.
- 18 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay. Could you put your name
- 19 here?
- 20 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Sure.
- 21 **SFC MORIARTY:** I was wondering what the

- 1 abbreviation for Monsignor was.
- 2 MSGR FRONTIERO: It's okay if I abbreviate it,
- 3 right?
- 4 SFC MORIARTY: Yeah. Not a problem. And your
- 5 duty station is -- you're assigned to the World --
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: The United Nations Embassy.
- 7 SFC MORIARTY: Okay. If you could just sort of
- 8 squeeze that in there.
- 9 MSGR FRONTIERO: Okay. Right here?
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** Yeah.
- 11 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Okay.
- 12 **SGT DELUCA:** So do you have diplomatic status?
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: Only in the United Nations but
- 14 no, I don't have a diplomatic passport.
- 15 **SGT DELUCA:** Well, you don't need it.
- 16 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** No.
- 17 SFC MORIARTY: And if you have no conditions, you
- 18 initial there.
- 19 MSGR FRONTIERO: None. And sign?
- 20 **SFC MORIARTY:** And sign right here and date it
- 21 there.

- 1 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Okay.
- 2 (Recess.)
- 3 **SFC MORIARTY:** You were just called away.
- 4 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Right.
- 5 **SFC MORIARTY:** And a family came down?
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: No. Actually the workers found a
- 7 black bag, a duffel bag with some material in it and
- 8 they thought there were some body parts attached to it,
- 9 but they found nothing. That was what I was --
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay.
- 11 MSGR FRONTIERO: You need me? Yes, they do need
- 12 me.
- 13 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay. That's not a problem. We'll
- 14 wait.
- 15 (Recess.)
- 16 MSGR FRONTIERO: It probably belonged to one of
- 17 the firefighters. It was a duffel bag with tools in it
- 18 and they thought that there still may be some kind of
- 19 body part attached to it or somewhere around it, but
- 20 they're searching it now, but they don't think there's
- 21 any -- they're calling the remains bio. If they see

- 1 there's bio there, that means body part. So at the
- 2 moment we'll just wait until they call me again.
- 3 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay. Now, is that a routine
- 4 practice?
- 5 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yes. What happens here is that
- 6 they bring in the bodies or the body parts, as it were,
- 7 and typically what happens is if a body is recovered or
- 8 a body part and it's identifiable as a police officer
- 9 or a firefighter, everyone that's here in uniform goes
- 10 down to the site, they drape the remains in an American
- 11 flag and they have a procession here, like a funeral
- 12 procession. They treat everyone with such dignity and
- 13 care, you know, particularly if they're a firefighter
- 14 or a police officer.
- 15 And then what happens is they bring the body or
- 16 the part -- the remains into the next tent and they
- 17 identify it to the best knowledge that they can, if
- 18 it's possible. They do a sample for DNA and then the
- 19 priest is called in to bless the remains.
- 20 **SGT DELUCA:** And do you give them like last rites
- 21 or --

- 1 MSGR FRONTIERO: No. We do not give last rites
- 2 because we can only give last rites for a person who is
- 3 alive.
- 4 SGT DELUCA: Oh. I didn't know that.
- 5 MSGR FRONTIERO: We do a blessing, prayers for the
- 6 dead and we bless the remains but we do not give the
- 7 sacrament of last rites. You cannot do that after a
- 8 person has died.
- 9 **SGT DELUCA:** I didn't realize that.
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** Now, the other thing -- earlier you
- 11 had said that maybe it was a family coming down and you
- 12 were going to pray with them.
- 13 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Right.
- 14 **SFC MORIARTY:** Is that also what's happening here?
- 15 MSGR FRONTIERO: The families don't come here to
- 16 this point. Before, when I went to the hospital and
- 17 early on I stopped at the armory to be with those
- 18 people because in the immediate -- immediately after
- 19 the incident, they were gathering in hospitals, the
- 20 armory, especially if their loved ones were missing.
- 21 **SGT DELUCA:** That's the Park Avenue Armory?

- 1 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right. Exactly. So I went there
- 2 one day and spent a few hours there with the people and
- 3 so forth, just to talk and pray with them as they
- 4 waited. Here it's a little bit different. We're
- 5 waiting to receive and bless the body remains. And
- 6 there are times when it's more busy than others,
- 7 naturally. Like this morning they -- I was told they
- 8 found quite a few body parts that they were bringing
- 9 in, so it was quite busy this morning here for the
- 10 priest on duty.
- 11 The priests are rotating every six hours here.
- 12 **SFC MORIARTY:** Really?
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: Two priests every six hours.
- 14 **SGT DELUCA:** Now, you're all volunteers?
- 15 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yes. This is Father -- Father
- 16 Paul has come from Rochester, New York.
- 17 **SGT DELUCA:** How are you doing, Father?
- 18 **FATHER PAUL:** Good.
- 19 **SGT DELUCA:** You came all the way down from
- 20 Rochester?
- 21 **FATHER PAUL:** I did. I came down today.

- 1 MSGR FRONTIERO: That's Dan and that's Joe.
- 2 **SFC MORIARTY:** Pleasure to meet you, sir.
- 3 MSGR FRONTIERO: Father Paul is going to be here
- 4 for four days. He's a retired priest and is
- 5 volunteering his time to help here and so we're a team
- 6 and we came down at 6:00 and then we'll leave at
- 7 midnight.
- 8 SFC MORIARTY: And another team --
- 9 MSGR FRONTIERO: Another team will come in. 24
- 10 hours a day there's always -- there are two priests.
- 11 SFC MORIARTY: And how about Rabbis and ministers?
- 12 Are they also involved in this or --
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: I'm not sure.
- 14 FATHER PAUL: I'm not sure, either, but I would
- 15 imagine so.
- 16 MSGR FRONTIERO: I think, though, that if they're
- 17 really kind of glad that the Catholic priests are here
- 18 only because we wear identifiable signs, the Roman
- 19 collar. I mean, in other religious traditions where
- 20 they wouldn't have this, they're not as visible and so
- 21 forth. But they like that sign. They were telling us

- 1 today during the briefing that it really is a
- 2 consolation to see us and that's why they encourage us
- 3 to walk around.
- 4 So Father Paul just went for a walk and then later
- 5 on I'll go for a walk.
- 6 SFC MORIARTY: Now do people on the site approach
- 7 you and talk to you while you're out there?
- 8 FATHER PAUL: I go up to them and if they want to
- 9 talk, they come up.
- 10 **SGT DELUCA:** How about you? Now, you were here
- 11 the first day --
- 12 MSGR FRONTIERO: But even -- well, let me see.
- 13 Shortly afterwards. And I spent a lot of time at the
- 14 hospital and went to the armory the one afternoon. The
- 15 Lennox Hill Hospital (phonetic) next to the place where
- 16 I live.
- 17 **SFC MORIARTY:** Right.
- 18 MSGR FRONTIERO: And the -- I have noticed that a
- 19 lot of the workers here come up and say thank you for
- 20 being here. Just a couple of guys, before you came
- 21 here, very appreciative, and said thank you so much, it

- 1 means a lot that we see the priests here. And so
- 2 that's gratifying. Although we're more glad that you
- 3 guys are here, really, and that they're here to do this
- 4 work because that really is the more important.
- 5 **SGT DELUCA:** That happened to me the other night
- 6 at our hotel. There were a couple of firefighters.
- 7 They must have just had a meeting. They were from
- 8 Ladder 30. You know, they had the patch on. And as
- 9 I'm walking by, one of them reached out and grabbed me
- 10 around the shoulder and said thanks for being here.
- 11 And, you know, I feel like so inadequate because
- 12 those are the guys that go to the front line, you know.
- 13 We're down here in support, you know, and our job is
- 14 to collect and document so that, you know, hopefully
- 15 this never happens again but if it does, there's an
- 16 institutional knowledge.
- Now, that institutional knowledge from your
- 18 (inaudible) -- now, when abouts -- how did you find out
- 19 about this so that you can volunteer to come here?
- 20 MSGR FRONTIERO: As soon as the terrorist attack
- 21 happened, shortly thereafter, I think three days later,

- 1 we got a fax from the Archdiocese of New York. All the
- 2 priests in the area. I don't know if you did up in
- 3 Rochester.
- 4 **FATHER PAUL:** No. No.
- 5 MSGR FRONTIERO: But we did here, those of us --
- 6 said an urgent appeal that you volunteer your time to
- 7 go to the hospitals and the armory and also call the
- 8 Archdiocese to volunteer for morgue duty down at the
- 9 site. And actually, they had an excellent response
- 10 from the clergy because I would have liked to have done
- 11 this more often so far but there's a good number of
- 12 guys that are just willing to come down. And 24 hours
- 13 a day there's always two Catholic priests here. So
- 14 that's really great. And that's how I got involved in
- 15 it, because of this urgent appeal that came out to all
- 16 the clergy.
- 17 **SFC MORIARTY:** Have you been over to the family
- 18 center at all?
- 19 MSGR FRONTIERO: No, I have not been to the family
- 20 center.
- 21 **SFC MORIARTY:** Do you know if there's other clergy

- 1 over there?
- 2 MSGR FRONTIERO: I imagine there are but I don't
- 3 know how that's actually working. Maybe -- I think
- 4 that may be where a lot of other denominations are
- 5 being called in because the -- perhaps there's more of
- 6 an association of religious denomination going on there
- 7 than there would be here. I think the Catholic clergy
- 8 are much more recognizable here, so that that's what
- 9 they're -- that's my sense. I don't know.
- 10 SFC MORIARTY: You had a question, I thought, from
- 11 the -- okay. Never mind. And the process is you
- 12 basically wait in this tent.
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right. We wait here.
- 14 **FATHER PAUL:** Yeah. Yeah.
- 15 **SFC MORIARTY:** And as you're needed they come from
- 16 next door?
- 17 MSGR FRONTIERO: Exactly. Yesterday or the day
- 18 before they found many bodies of --
- 19 **SGT DELUCA:** Yeah. We were here that day and they
- 20 said they found an elevator?
- 21 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yeah.

- 1 SGT DELUCA: And going back to what you were
- 2 talking about before, the respect, and I notice that
- 3 everybody came to attention and presented arms --
- 4 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yes.
- 5 **SGT DELUCA:** -- as they came up. And even today,
- 6 as -- we were in Battery Park today and then we came to
- 7 (inaudible) site, and as we were leaving traffic was
- 8 stopped allowing the ambulance out, and again the same
- 9 thing. Everybody came to attention (inaudible).
- 10 **MSGR FRONTIERO**: Yeah.
- 11 SGT DELUCA: So, I mean, it's -- were you on that
- 12 day?
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: No. I wasn't here on that day.
- 14 No.
- 15 **SGT DELUCA:** About how many times have you been
- 16 here?
- 17 MSGR FRONTIERO: This is my first night here and
- 18 I've never come to this site yet before today.
- 19 **SGT DELUCA:** Where have you been before?
- 20 MSGR FRONTIERO: Just the hospital and the armory.
- 21 **SGT DELUCA:** Okay.

- 1 MSGR FRONTIERO: That's where -- then I
- 2 volunteered and then they just called me for this
- 3 tonight.
- 4 SFC MORIARTY: Were you at the missing persons --
- 5 where they've got the missing persons --
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: On 68th Street.
- 7 **SFC MORIARTY:** 68th.
- 8 MSGR FRONTIERO: Exactly. I went there the
- 9 Saturday after the attack and --
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** So it must have been an incredible
- 11 scene.
- 12 MSGR FRONTIERO: Oh, yeah. Lots and lots of
- 13 people and very emotional.
- 14 SGT DELUCA: How do you deal with that? I mean,
- 15 doesn't --
- 16 MSGR FRONTIERO: It affects me personally, you
- 17 know. I have -- I had a few sleepless nights since
- 18 this started and -- but I basically talk to the priest
- 19 that I live with at home about it. That helps, you
- 20 know. But I found at first going there, going back and
- 21 watching the news, it made -- so saturated by the news.

- 1 They never -- that's all you can get on any channel.
- 2 And I found at the beginning I couldn't sleep because
- 3 it kept staying with me in my brain at night and just
- 4 made me very restless.
- 5 **SGT DELUCA:** The horror.
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: Just thinking about what's going
- 7 to happen next, they're going to do this, they're going
- 8 to do that. It became a real --
- 9 SFC MORIARTY: I do the same thing you do, you
- 10 know. When I wasn't at the newspaper, I was home
- 11 watching it on television and, I mean, I was staying up
- 12 till 2:00 in the morning and getting up at 6:00 the
- 13 next day to go to work. And after four days, I
- 14 couldn't bear to watch anymore. I couldn't see that
- 15 plane flying into the side of the building anymore.
- 16 SGT DELUCA: When you closed your eyes at night
- 17 and see that plane hit that tower.
- 18 **SFC MORIARTY:** Exactly. Yeah. And the fireball
- 19 and the rest of this. And from my hometown in
- 20 (inaudible) there were three people. There was one on
- 21 Flight 11 and there were two in the towers. And we're

- 1 a small town in Western Massachusetts, 40,000 people.
- 2 And we had three people that could have easily
- 3 have been in it. So there's six people in our small
- 4 town and if that's happening all across America, you
- 5 know, because New York is -- New York is one of those
- 6 destination cities that a lot of people come to.
- Now, you've been in New York for how long?
- 8 MSGR FRONTIERO: Almost three years.
- 9 SFC MORIARTY: And prior to that you were --
- 10 MSGR FRONTIERO: I was in Washington, D.C.
- 11 SGT DELUCA: You were going to school in
- 12 Washington, weren't you?
- 13 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yeah.
- 14 **SGT DELUCA:** Which school, Georgetown?
- 15 MSGR FRONTIERO: No, Catholic University.
- 16 **SGT DELUCA:** Catholic University?
- 17 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yeah.
- 18 **SGT DELUCA:** And what were you studying?
- 19 MSGR FRONTIERO: I studied moral theology.
- 20 **SGT DELUCA:** What was that?
- 21 MSGR FRONTIERO: Moral theology.

- 1 **SGT DELUCA:** Amoral --
- 2 MSGR FRONTIERO: (Laughter.) Health care ethics.
- 3 **SGT DELUCA:** Okay. Okay.
- 4 **SFC MORIARTY:** And you're a monsignor, right?
- 5 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Right.
- 6 SFC MORIARTY: And that's an academic --
- 7 MSGR FRONTIERO: That's an honorary title.
- 8 SFC MORIARTY: Oh. I thought it was an academic
- 9 title.
- 10 MSGR FRONTIERO: No, it's strictly honorary.
- 11 **SFC MORIARTY:** And were in the Vatican at all?
- 12 MSGR FRONTIERO: No. I mean, I've been there. I
- 13 work now for the Vatican.
- 14 **SFC MORIARTY:** Oh. So you work for the Vatican
- 15 here in New York.
- 16 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Exactly.
- 17 **SFC MORIARTY:** Have you noticed a change in the
- 18 community of New York?
- 19 MSGR FRONTIERO: Oh, yes. I mean, I think this
- 20 seems to be a more respectful atmosphere. I mean,
- 21 people seem to respect one another a little bit more.

- 1 They're more friendly. As a priest I can walk down the
- 2 street and people say hello, Father. That never
- 3 happened before. I've had people come up and ask me to
- 4 bless them or pray for them. Just, you know, not
- 5 around here or in the hospital; just on the street.
- 6 And one man came up to me -- a few nights ago I
- 7 was walking home late at night. I had gone out for a
- 8 dinner and he came out from the shadows of the street
- 9 and I thought he was going to ask me for money or
- 10 something. He looked like a street person. And so he
- 11 said hey, Father. And then grabbed my hands and he
- 12 started kissing my hands. And then he embraced me and
- 13 kissed me and he said, would you please bless me? And
- 14 so I blessed him, and then he left.
- But that shocked me because in New York you're not
- 16 used to that. I thought really -- I said, this guy is
- 17 going to ask me for money or try to do something. He
- 18 looked like a pretty frightening character. But that's
- 19 all he was looking for. And I think this whole
- 20 incident has created something in people, sensitized
- 21 them more to the value of human life in some way, you

- 1 know, and the need for God, too, I think.
- 2 SFC MORIARTY: Well, I think the other thing, too,
- 3 is that it's changed your perspective.
- 4 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right.
- 5 **SFC MORIARTY:** I mean, this is a tragedy of such
- 6 magnitude that it's hard to comprehend and our petty
- 7 problems and desires and the rest of that just don't
- 8 match up, you know. This is so immeasurable.
- 9 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Exactly.
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** Because we've seen it ourselves.
- 11 We've also seen the brotherhood who are down here and
- 12 because we're wearing these uniforms, we've been
- 13 privileged to be allowed into that brotherhood. But I
- 14 don't envy you your task here tonight. And looking out
- 15 the window, the people -- is that a summons again for
- 16 you?
- 17 MSGR FRONTIERO: Well, that's something different.
- 18 They just --
- 19 **SFC MORIARTY:** Because you notice that neither one
- 20 of us are asking (inaudible). I have no desire to see
- 21 that end of this process. And from what I understand,

- 1 a lot of the bodies are body parts.
- 2 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yes.
- 3 SFC MORIARTY: And DNA is how they hope to
- 4 identify them?
- 5 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Exactly.
- 6 **FATHER PAUL**: Yes.
- 7 **SFC MORIARTY:** That's one of the things that you
- 8 notice here in the back of my military ID, this little
- 9 strip.
- 10 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** That's DNA?
- 11 **SFC MORIARTY:** Yes.
- 12 MSGR FRONTIERO: Wow.
- 13 **SFC MORIARTY:** And they started doing this for all
- 14 soldiers. You have one of those, too, don't you? They
- 15 take your blood and the rest of the stuff and they do a
- 16 DNA analysis. And from what I understand talking to
- 17 some of the police and fire officers, they also do that
- 18 here.
- 19 MSGR FRONTIERO: Wow.
- 20 **SFC MORIARTY:** So other than what, what you have
- 21 to start doing is getting the family members to come in

- 1 and donate blood so they can start matching --
- 2 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yeah. It's a very tedious
- 3 process.
- 4 SFC MORIARTY: And how -- as clergy, this is what
- 5 you help people with. How do you help people who never
- 6 had the closure of a funeral, of having their loved one
- 7 where they could put them in a casket and put them in a
- 8 cemetery where they can go up every memorial day and
- 9 put the flowers out and stop by and pray?
- 10 **FATHER PAUL:** That's the hard part. That tears
- 11 their heart out because they can't do that. They can't
- 12 go someplace and do something with their hands, express
- 13 their grief.
- 14 MSGR FRONTIERO: I think most clergy are really
- 15 being very good in asking and inviting families that
- 16 have family that are missing to have memorial services.
- 17 We just had one in our church, even though there's no
- 18 body. There's a young man who his fiancé was killed
- 19 and they haven't recovered the body but we had a
- 20 memorial service for her at the church, which seems to
- 21 -- that seems to help. I mean, you've got to do

- 1 something. You've got to ritualize the loss in some
- 2 way and I think the church is really prepared to do
- 3 that, where we want to do that and it's one way to help
- 4 the families and to also bring some kind of closure to
- 5 this for them.
- 6 FATHER PAUL: We had a case which was very
- 7 interesting. A young lady committed suicide and asked
- 8 that her body be cremated and the ashes spread among
- 9 the rose garden in the backyard of her parents' house.
- 10 And they did that and we had a service. But those
- 11 parents had no place to go, as you say, on memorial
- 12 day. It was a beautiful thought.
- 13 Before I retired, they came and said Father, would
- 14 you mind -- could we take some of the soil from the
- 15 rose garden where we spread the ashes, bring them to
- 16 the cemetery and put them in a grave and have a
- 17 headstone, so that they have a place to come by. You
- 18 know, everybody else comes and decorates their grave;
- 19 they had no place.
- 20 **SFC MORIARTY:** I understand that some of the
- 21 families have requested some of the ashes from here.

- 1 **FATHER PAUL:** Yeah. Yeah.
- 2 SFC MORIARTY: And that's something that I called
- 3 up the newspaper and asked one of my co-workers to call
- 4 up these three families who had lost to see if they
- 5 were interested in pursuing that. If they were, I was
- 6 going to go over to the family center and try to get
- 7 some information for them.
- 8 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yeah.
- 9 **SFC MORIARTY:** But then I realized, too, that --
- 10 how do they get the death certificates? They must have
- 11 already had to come here because this would be where
- 12 the death certificate would be issued, isn't it?
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: The family center.
- 14 **SFC MORIARTY:** Yeah. Because I don't think they
- 15 can issue it in Westfield.
- 16 MSGR FRONTIERO: No. I think they have to come
- 17 here.
- 18 **SFC MORIARTY:** So they may have already come here.
- 19 You know, it raises -- it's not just this incident.
- 20 It's the stone into the pond that ripples and ripples.
- 21 For years there's going to be those kinds -- and

- 1 again, as clergy, you'll be counseling people.
- 2 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yeah.
- 3 **FATHER PAUL:** Yeah.
- 4 SFC MORIARTY: And how do you prepare yourselves
- 5 for -- because that is emotionally draining.
- 6 **FATHER PAUL**: Yes.
- 7 MSGR FRONTIERO: Oh, yes. Well, I think, you
- 8 know, part of what grounds us is our faith. And I
- 9 think that's the big difference between, for example, a
- 10 counselor or a social worker and who we are as priests.
- 11 Faith is a tremendous consolation for us and our
- 12 belief that, you know, for example, love doesn't end in
- 13 the grave. It's not the end. So this faith of ours is
- 14 what I find will get us -- get me through as a priest.
- 15 I mean, if this were it, if this -- then yeah. I
- 16 mean, I don't know how we would be able to do what we
- 17 do, and that's what we've got to try to help the people
- 18 to believe in. We've got to give them hope despite the
- 19 fact that sin and death has intruded into their lives.
- 20 There's such destruction and violence, you know, and
- 21 it's not an easy task.

- 1 But I find a lot of my family has been asking
- 2 well, what are you doing? I mean, you help people and
- 3 then who helps you? And that's one of the
- 4 difficulties, you know. But when we went for the
- 5 briefing -- tonight after we finish at midnight we have
- 6 to go back and we're going to just talk for a little
- 7 while about, you know, how we're feeling, how is it
- 8 going. It just helps to verbalize what's going on in
- 9 your head and your heart. It helps.
- 10 **SFC MORIARTY:** You also have your own
- 11 international brotherhood. Like we know they talk
- 12 about the international brotherhood of police officers.
- 13 **FATHER PAUL:** Yeah. Yeah.
- 14 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right.
- 15 **SFC MORIARTY:** You have one of the largest
- 16 international brotherhoods of priests and you usually
- 17 have a friend or a confessor that you can approach when
- 18 you have your moments --
- 19 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Exactly.
- 20 **SFC MORIARTY:** -- of pain and whatnot. They've
- 21 already started turning lights on here.

- 1 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yeah.
- 2 **SFC MORIARTY:** Is there anything that I haven't
- 3 asked you about in this process that perhaps should be
- 4 documented or anything personal that you want to add?
- 5 MSGR FRONTIERO: I don't know. I don't think so.
- 6 I don't think so.
- 7 SGT DELUCA: And through all this, in addition to
- 8 these additional duties, you've still been doing your
- 9 function (inaudible)?
- 10 MSGR FRONTIERO: Oh, yes. Yes. Although my boss
- 11 (inaudible) has been very good. I told him that I'd
- 12 like to do something and he said, oh, by all means, you
- 13 know, it's a good idea that I try to help in any little
- 14 way that I can. So he's been very good. Oh, yeah.
- 15 But I still -- I worked a full day today and left
- 16 early to come here.
- But you know, for me, this kind of work and
- 18 dealing with people is really what the priesthood is
- 19 all about. Right now I happen to have a desk job, you
- 20 know, and I'm not crazy about it. But I prefer to be
- 21 with people in their hour of need and moments of joy

- 1 and sorrow and to do the work of a priest in the
- 2 trenches. That's what I like to do.
- 3 SFC MORIARTY: It would seem to me that with the
- 4 way the political things are shaping out here now,
- 5 don't you feel vulnerable at all being in the UN
- 6 buildings because it would seem to me that they would
- 7 be an ideal terrorist target.
- 8 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right. Well, the UN -- I mean,
- 9 they're very, very concerned right now that there will
- 10 be some kind of attack. They're certainly preparing
- 11 for it. They have very close security. You can't
- 12 drive anywhere near the UN. And also, they've had two
- 13 drills now, bomb drills, you know, for all of the staff
- 14 people at the United Nations and delegates who go to
- 15 work there. You had to go and practice evacuating the
- 16 building. So they're taking every precaution.
- 17 **SGT DELUCA:** Did they have nuns in the hallways
- 18 directing people where to go?
- 19 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** (Laughter.)
- 20 **SFC MORIARTY:** I always found that -- I went to
- 21 Catholic school so I always found that the good sisters

- 1 were most efficient in getting people to do what they
- 2 were supposed to do.
- 3 MSGR FRONTIERO: That's good. But I personally
- 4 don't feel worried or anxious about that. I don't know
- 5 why but I just don't.
- 6 **SFC MORIARTY:** Okay. Do you have any questions?
- 7 **SGT DELUCA:** You mentioned the security around the
- 8 UN. Who is providing that? Is it the police?
- 9 MSGR FRONTIERO: I think it's -- the UN has its
- 10 own security people -- force. So they are providing
- 11 the security, which they always have security there.
- 12 But what they do have now that's different is they have
- 13 these huge sand trucks all over the place and the
- 14 perimeter of the United Nations so you can't drive a
- 15 car in. And those are, I imagine, city trucks. I'm
- 16 not sure. But --
- 17 **SGT DELUCA:** On the UN property itself, because
- 18 it's a jurisdictional thing --
- 19 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Yes.
- 20 **SGT DELUCA:** -- the UN is international territory.
- 21 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** Exactly.

- 1 SGT DELUCA: It's not US territory so even though
- 2 the New York Police Department works very closely in
- 3 conjunction, they have responsibility for the UN
- 4 property. But there will probably be rings of New York
- 5 police outside of that and several layers deep.
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: Right. And also the State
- 7 Department of the United States is responsible for
- 8 diplomatic security, you know, for protecting the
- 9 diplomats who are here. So they have their own network
- 10 of people that are involved in this whole thing, too.
- 11 **SGT DELUCA:** Plus it's all the counselors
- 12 throughout all of New York.
- 13 MSGR FRONTIERO: Exactly. All of that. But the
- 14 mayor has been very directive in how the United Nations
- 15 will proceed with its work because, as you know,
- 16 they've postponed the general debate wherein the heads
- 17 of state come every fall for a two-week period. They
- 18 now are thinking of having that in November. But
- 19 that --
- 20 **SGT DELUCA:** He just spoke, Giuliani --
- 21 **MSGR FRONTIERO:** On Monday.

- 1 **SGT DELUCA:** Right.
- 2 **SFC MORIARTY:** Were you there?
- 3 MSGR FRONTIERO: Yes, I was there for that. And
- 4 it was a very good speech.
- 5 **SFC MORIARTY:** How was his reception?
- 6 MSGR FRONTIERO: Excellent. Excellent. I think
- 7 he received a standing ovation for more than two
- 8 minutes. It was really quite impressive. But he gave
- 9 a great speech to the United Nations which they could
- 10 really -- they need to hear once in a while that
- 11 they've got to really -- they've got to be decidedly
- 12 against terrorism and they've got to take action, not
- 13 just talk about it. The UN is a --
- 14 **SFC MORIARTY:** Very good at talking.
- 15 MSGR FRONTIERO: Don't get me going on the United
- 16 Nations. So he -- there's no holds barred with him.
- 17 He just really told it like it was and did a very good
- 18 job.
- 19 **SFC MORIARTY:** Nothing further? No questions?
- 20 Then we'll end the interview right now.
- 21 (The interview was concluded.)

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
