## Paintballs simulate bullets at urban assault course

RAPID CITY, S.D. – Soldiers utilized paintball gear as part of the realistic urban warfare training they received Thursday, June 12, at West Camp Rapid.

The Army Reserve's 475th Quartermaster Battalion of Farell, Pa., and the 330th Medical Brigade of Fort Sheridan, Ill., were instructed in the tactics of urban combat during the Military Operations in Urban Terrain class at this year's Golden Coyote training exercise.

Soldiers attended classroom training to familiarize themselves with the basic fundamentals, and then had the opportunity to practice their techniques before engaging in the actual training lane consisting of an imitation village, mock civilians and hidden enemies.

"The MOUT course is designed to be as realistic as possible, with unexpected attacks, unknown locations of enemies, and an indefinite number of hostile civilians," said Capt. Roger Ogden, an instructor for the course. "This is done to ensure an unpredictable exercise, keeping the students on their toes."

Soldiers are expected to know the proper procedures and possible complications that occur in today's urban battlefields, Ogden added.

Once the unit members were ready to progress to the training lane, they were outfitted with paintball guns and safety masks and split into teams, where they applied their newly-acquired urban warfare techniques against the instructors, themselves.

The weapons they used may have been imitation, but the training the Soldiers received was very real.

"Most of the instructors are experienced infantrymen, military police, and combat arms specialists – all of whom have a vast amount of knowledge to share with the troops," said Staff Sgt. David Elliston, a MOUT instructor and former infantryman.

This training has become an increasingly important part of standard Army preparation for all Soldiers, especially new trainees or those about to deploy, said Elliston.

"This training is very important," said Elliston. "It's my duty to ensure these students survive, and each one who comes back from deployment is a sign that I'm doing it right."

**NOTE:** The South Dakota National Guard will host the annual Golden Coyote exercise from June 7 – 21 in the southern Black Hills. More than 4,000 service members from 92 units representing 27 states and four foreign nations are participating in the exercise. The Golden Coyote exercise has been conducted for the past 24 years. The exercise provides relevant training opportunities in support of the war on terror and homeland defense.

Residents should be aware of an increase in military traffic throughout the Black Hills and an increase in the level of noise due to military operations. Aviation activity will be operating out of Camp Rapid and the Army Aviation Support Facility next to the Rapid City Regional Airport.

Aircraft will be primarily training on equipment and personnel transport missions as well as medical evacuation. Aircraft will respond to real-world emergencies during the exercise and remain in an all-hours-ready status during the exercise.

Spectators to military training are welcome, however caution is warranted and spectators are asked to remain at a safe distance from all moving military vehicles and aircraft to prevent injury to personnel or damage to property.
