STATUS

The Chairman and Ranking Member of the House Armed Services Committee have introduced the National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) for Fiscal Year 2013. The bill, H.R. 4310, includes provisions submitted by the Department of Defense to create the basis for the NDAA Congress will eventually mark-up. The Department will continue to submit proposals for the NDAA that will be reflected during Committee work. The Senate Armed Services Committee traditionally introduces their version of the NDAA after completing work at the Committee level.

The House Armed Services Committee will take up the NDAA during the week of 23 April. The Personnel Subcommittee and Seapower and Projection Forces Subcommittee will mark-up the bill on 26 April. The Tactical Air and Land Forces Subcommittee and Readiness Subcommittee will mark-up the bill on 27 April. The full House Armed Services Committee is expected to approve the bill on 9 May.

The Senate Armed Services Committee is tentative scheduled to work on the bill during the week of 21 May.

Appropriations

Reduction of Strategic Airlift Requirement: The shell would reduce the number of strategic airlift airframes that must be maintained by the Air Force from 301 to 275 (Sec. 118). The Fiscal Year 2012 NDAA included a provision that lowered the number of strategic airlift airframes from 316 to 301.

<u>Quadrennial Long-Term Plan for Procurement of Navy and Air Force Aircraft:</u> The shell would require the Secretary of Defense to submit a plan for the procurement of Navy and Air Force Aircraft to support the recommendations of the Quadrennial Defense Review (QDR). The report would be submitted with the budget during each year a QDR is submitted. The report would include a detailed 10-year procurement plan and a notional 20-year procurement plan (Sec. 119).

Military Personnel Policy

Lawful Permanent Residents Appointed as Officers in the National Guard: The shell would allow lawful permanent residents to be appointed as officers in the National Guard (Sec. 511). This provision would bring appointment requirements under title 32 into alignment with those provisions under title 10.

<u>Placement of Non-Dual Status Technicians in the Excepted Service</u>: The shell would place members serving as National Guard Non-Dual Status Technicians in the excepted service will all Dual-Status Technicians (Sec. 512).

Additional Behavioral Health Professional to Conduct Pre-Separation Medical Exams for <u>PTSD</u>: The shell would enlarge the pool of behavioral health professionals that are authorized to conduct pre-separation medical exams for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder to include psychiatrists, licensed clinical social workers, and psychiatric nurse practitioners (Sec. 542).

Other Authorizations

Drug Interdiction and Counter Drug: The shell would authorize \$999,363,000* for drug interdiction and counter drug activities of the Department of Defense (Sec. 1305).
