- 1 PROCEEDINGS
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: This is MAJ Les' Melnyk, Army
- 3 National Guard Historian for the National Guard Bureau.
- I am interviewing MAJ George Chin. He is the
- 5 Deputy G-3 for the 42nd Infantry Division, and, in this
- 6 operation, he was acting as a liaison officer for the
- 7 National Guard operations relating to the terrorist
- 8 attack in New York City on 11 September.
- 9 This interview is taking place on the 19th of
- 10 September at Battery Park in New York City.
- 11 MAJ Chin, you have read and signed the access
- 12 agreement for oral history materials and agreed that
- 13 everything you say here can be used by the Army however
- 14 they wish.
- MAJ CHIN: Yes, I do.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: Could you start by telling us a
- 17 little bit about your background, your civilian
- 18 background and your military background, including just
- 19 to let us know where you're coming from.
- 20 MAJ CHIN: Okay. Basically, I entered the
- 21 National Guard back in 1982, December of 1982, with the

- 1 101st Cavalry. I came in as an enlisted personnel. I
- 2 was, prior to that, enlisted active duty three years
- 3 with the 44th MED Brigade, and on entering the National
- 4 Guard, I was a medic for about one year and I entered
- 5 into the OCS program up at Camp Smith, New York, and
- 6 was commissioned second lieutenant in 1985.
- 7 From that point on, I had gone down to the
- 8 basic course, Armor Branch, down at Fort Knox,
- 9 Kentucky, and I was with the 101st CAV until 1987.
- I came out of HHC as the company commander and
- 11 from that point, I was assigned to the 42nd Infantry
- 12 Division and the G-3 under COL Nagle (phonetic.)
- I was a battle captain there for the 1989
- 14 Warfighter at Fort Leavenworth.
- 15 After the Warfighter exercise, I had returned
- 16 back to the 101st CAV as the Battalion S-3. LTC
- 17 Generieux had -- was change of command with LTC
- 18 Costagliola.
- 19 At that point, I had moved into the battalion
- 20 XO slot, but there was a lateral transfer with MAJ Durr
- 21 and myself up at division.

- 1 So basically I am up there as the Deputy G-3,
- 2 and that's where my current duty position right at this
- 3 moment.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: You've had that since --
- 5 **MAJ CHIN:** Since two ATs ago.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. Your civilian capacity?
- 7 **MAJ CHIN:** Yeah. I work for a company called
- 8 Packard Bioscience, and basically they manufacture
- 9 equipment that measures radioactivity.
- 10 My service down at Fort Mammoth, New Jersey,
- 11 basically some of those well known pharmaceutical
- 12 companies, Merck in Rahway, New Jersey, Schering Plough
- 13 in Kenilworth, New Jersey, Wyeth-Ayerst and Lederle in
- 14 Grove River, New York, and a few other outliers of
- 15 these companies.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: Where do you live?
- 17 MAJ CHIN: I reside in Staten Island, New
- 18 York. I've been there since 1965, when my parents had
- 19 moved there. I was basically born in the Bronx, New
- 20 York, and the only time basically I was out from my
- 21 residence here in New York was during my time in active

- 1 duty at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: Okay. Sir, if we could take it
- 3 now to September 11. If you could, describe what you
- 4 were doing when you learned about the attack and what
- 5 your first reactions were.
- 6 MAJ CHIN: Basically, it was pretty much a
- 7 normal day, getting up. I had gone over to Fort
- 8 Wadsworth, which is no longer Fort Wadsworth. It's
- 9 owned by the Coast Guard. It used to be the Naval
- 10 station.
- 11 MAJ MELNYK: It's located on the Staten Island
- 12 end of the Verrazano Narrows Bridge.
- 13 MAJ CHIN: Right. And I had worked out in the
- 14 gym prior to going to work, and I heard over -- upon
- 15 going home, I heard something about a plane that had
- 16 collided into the World Trade Center, and I didn't get
- 17 all the bits and pieces.
- 18 It was a lot of confusion and basically my
- 19 understanding was that maybe -- well, my feeling was
- 20 that maybe perhaps an airliner or small Cessna or
- 21 something of that sort maybe veered into the towers.

- 1 And at that point, I kind of went up
- 2 overlooking the harbor to see if I could see it, and I
- 3 seen some large dark smoke coming out. All of a
- 4 sudden, I notice, also, a big flash from the other,
- 5 coming out of the side of the building of the second
- 6 tower.
- 7 And there were some workers landscaping and
- 8 they had the radio on from their trucks and one worker
- 9 also had a Nextel cell phone he was getting in some
- 10 information from down here from the Battery Park.
- 11 At that point, we seen one of the first towers
- 12 collapse and I can hear large rumbling from Staten
- 13 Island, from here, when the tower had dropped.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: So you were at Fort Wadsworth
- 15 watching across the harbor.
- 16 **MAJ CHIN:** Yes.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** For quite some time, then.
- 18 MAJ CHIN: Some time, then.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** Yeah.
- 20 **MAJ CHIN:** And basically from listening to the
- 21 radios, they shut down all the bridges just for

- 1 security purposes and basically traffic, you can hear a
- 2 lot of sirens going on and basically a lot of chaos
- 3 going on.
- 4 At that point, I started -- proceeded to go
- 5 home. I listened to my voicemail from the job and
- 6 informed my boss, and my boss says, basically, you
- 7 know, if you can, don't worry about work today.
- 8 At that point, my next message was that the
- 9 Troy Armory had said that I needed to report up to the
- 10 Troy Armory at the EOC.
- 11 **MAJ MELNYK:** About what time was that?
- 12 MAJ CHIN: I think it was around 1000, 1100
- 13 hours on that Tuesday morning.
- And at that point, when I was en route home,
- 15 traffic was backed up quite a bit on the Staten Island
- 16 Expressway. They had kind of sealed off the bridges.
- 17 Pretty much it was chaos going on. A lot of
- 18 cars were going in reverse, turning around, driving
- 19 against traffic, people going through red lights.
- 20 At that point, I collected my gear. I was
- 21 still not able to get off the island. I did phone the

- 1 Troy EOC command post there and informed them that I
- 2 was not able to and that I was going into my former
- 3 battalion, reporting in there at the 101st CAV on
- 4 Staten Island.
- 5 At that point, I reported to colonel
- 6 Costagliola and basically what we did was tried to get
- 7 everybody who was coming in on the alert and get an
- 8 accountability, and not all of the staff was able to
- 9 come in.
- 10 So I assisted colonel Costagliola in whatever
- 11 means that he wanted me to do. Basically, what we did
- 12 was we started getting EOC numbers, point of contacts
- 13 up at the 53rd Troop Command, and just established some
- 14 open communication and reported to them as to what the
- 15 strength was currently.
- 16 We did gather a small convoy of medics, small
- 17 groups of senior NCOs, MSG Ralph Urizzo, colonel Nachio
- 18 (phonetic,) who was a JAG officer who was assigned
- 19 there.
- 20 They basically was an advance party or
- 21 quartering party to come into Manhattan and evaluate

- 1 and assist in any way possible.
- We got reports back that it was pretty bad and
- 3 basically from our understanding, was that the fire
- 4 department, their command center was located at the
- 5 World Trade Center and it knocked out most of their top
- 6 officials who were in command of that center for --
- 7 throughout New York City.
- Back at Staten Island, we did have a Battalion
- 9 Commander Leonard. He did stop by Staten Island
- 10 Armory, just to see what kind of equipment that we did
- 11 have.
- 12 MAJ MELNYK: This is the fire department.
- 13 MAJ CHIN: The fire chief.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Fire chief.
- 15 MAJ CHIN: Fire department chief. And
- 16 basically he wanted to see what kind of equipment that
- 17 the military had at the armory at Staten Island.
- 18 And he did inform us that the top command,
- 19 chain of command was wiped out at the World Trade
- 20 Center and that they were now trying to get a handle
- 21 and command and control.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: Previous folks that I spoke to
- 2 from the 101st told me that there was a fire department
- 3 EOC collocated almost with the armory or located
- 4 nearby.
- 5 MAJ CHIN: Yes. Right across the street from
- 6 Slossen Avenue. We did provide an APC just to block
- 7 off the entranceway, just for security purposes,
- 8 because we did not know if there was going to be any
- 9 other attacks.
- 10 Basically, the party that came in to Staten
- 11 Island, they eventually returned late Tuesday night and
- 12 they reported back as to what they'd seen. Most of
- 13 them started to go down on the West Side Highway here
- 14 next to the -- even off of Broadway.
- There were just body parts just laying all
- 16 over the streets and --
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** Again, what party had gone in?
- 18 **MAJ CHIN:** We had mostly medics that --
- 19 whatever medical personnel that we had. We even had
- 20 some Reservists come in, reporting in that they were a
- 21 field medic.

- Of course, they showed us appropriate IDs and
- 2 stuff like that and we just sent whatever ambulances,
- 3 ambulance Humvees into the area, as well as the senior
- 4 NCOs and I'm not -- I think it was CPT Reilly who also
- 5 went in there.
- 6 **MAJ MELNYK:** Yes.
- 7 **MAJ CHIN:** With that convoy.
- 8 MAJ MELNYK: They came back that night or some
- 9 of them?
- 10 MAJ CHIN: They did return probably -- it
- 11 might have even been past midnight, into like Wednesday
- 12 morning at that point, and there might have been some
- 13 that might have stayed back here.
- I understood that they set up a -- it was a
- 15 command post, I think, right around Liberty Street near
- 16 the site where it was up there. And basically they
- 17 were given like flags and cones and stuff, where they
- 18 seen body parts and stuff like that, so that they would
- 19 try to help out the OEM, I guess.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** When did you get in?
- 21 MAJ CHIN: I came in Wednesday morning and

- 1 basically I came in with the scouts and everyone else.
- 2 I guess, as far as I can recollect, but the eerie
- 3 feeling was going through the Battery Tunnel.
- I used to work in Manhattan two years ago,
- 5 quite a number of years, and to be faced with traffic
- 6 just from Staten Island going to 57th Street, it used
- 7 to take me an hour and a half just to go 18 miles.
- 8 And that particular morning, there was like no
- 9 traffic out at all. The Battery Tunnel was shut down,
- 10 just with the Tri-Borough Bridge police, and they
- 11 checked IDs and allowed military vehicles to go through
- 12 there.
- But they did inform me that halfway through
- 14 the tunnel, that there was no lights. And when we got
- 15 to that point, all you seen was just black soot and
- 16 smoke. You couldn't even see -- the only thing that
- 17 you could see in front of you was just as much as the
- 18 headlights would show.
- 19 And it was basically an eerie feeling because
- 20 you knew that the buildings went down, you just did not
- 21 know what to expect when you got on the outside of the

- 1 tunnel.
- When we did get through, we kind of reported
- 3 down here at the Battery Park area, where most of all
- 4 the troops were using as an assembly area, and we
- 5 pretty much coordinated with the police department and
- 6 pretty much got our missions from there.
- 7 During that interim, even from Tuesday on, I
- 8 was trying to get a hold of MAJ Bob Magnanini, because
- 9 he and I usually travel up together, because we're
- 10 primarily basically senior staff guys from the division
- 11 that lived downstate New York here, and we'd usually
- 12 car pool it together.
- 13 And cell phones were very -- they either
- 14 worked or they didn't work. The public telephones here
- in the area did not work at all, even on Staten Island,
- 16 I guess maybe because the World Trade Center had a lot
- 17 of the antennas or the microwave antennas to provide
- 18 that transmission, and like I said, it just either
- 19 worked or it didn't work.
- Other than that, later that night, on
- 21 Wednesday, there was quite a bit of number of missions

- 1 that were going on, cordon -- blocking off the World
- 2 Trade Center.
- 3 **MAJ MELNYK:** Since you were something of an
- 4 orphan officer, how did the 101 use you? What role did
- 5 you play?
- 6 MAJ CHIN: Basically, it was still liaison,
- 7 but I think we were waiting for MAJ Durr, who was the
- 8 battalion XO, to come down.
- 9 He was trying to rally up Bravo Company and
- 10 Charlie Company from Bravo B up in Troy, New York, and
- 11 Charlie Company from Hoosick Falls.
- 12 And the battalion S-3, who was a Suffolk
- 13 County cop, wasn't there. So I was probably playing a
- 14 bit of a dual role there and just taking orders, see
- 15 whatever I can do to help out the battalion and
- 16 contact.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** And since there was only -- the
- 18 battalion commander was the only other field grade
- 19 there. You --
- 20 **MAJ CHIN:** Right.
- 21 MAJ MELNYK: You filled in, since you had

- 1 actually served in the S-3 capacity at the time before.
- 2 MAJ CHIN: Right. So basically the
- 3 scouts had a mission to block off key intersections to
- 4 allow construction workers, firefighters, police to get
- 5 in there.
- 6 It might have even been in Thursday. You
- 7 would start losing track of time and all sense as to
- 8 what's going around and just kind of focusing in on
- 9 what's in front of you.
- 10 But we did get a mission where a lot of the
- 11 outside New York City Fire Department, they had
- 12 volunteer fire department from New Jersey, out of state
- 13 people coming in, off duty cops, people trying to get
- 14 in heavy duty construction equipment and setting it up.
- The Liberty Plaza area, basically, they asked
- 16 for National Guard detail of about maybe of a platoon
- 17 size, which we had with the scouts, and we kind of
- 18 walked the line up and kind of cleared the area and
- 19 basically the police chief there said that he was
- 20 trying to do that for three hours, and wasn't able to
- 21 do it.

- 1 And we kind of cleared it off and coordinated
- 2 -- cordoned off the area within 15 minutes. And there
- 3 was a lot of cooperation. There as no animosity
- 4 between the civilian side and the city workers and us.
- 5 But what was really eerie is to see the site
- 6 itself, the buildings just torn apart and the World
- 7 Trade Center just completely down, and it was just only
- 8 a matter of maybe, what, four stories high, if that,
- 9 and just, you know, the smoke, just constantly burning.
- 10 And with there being already a little more
- 11 than a week now, you know, there's still smoldering
- 12 fire that's coming up.
- The eerie thing is that you don't see any
- 14 office equipment, you don't see any ceiling tiles, you
- 15 don't see any furniture. Maybe you only seen one
- 16 computer monitor come out of the whole thing and
- 17 apparently one of the fire chiefs there and, I guess,
- 18 one of the civil engineers said that the intensity of
- 19 the heat inside when the plane had crashed into the
- 20 building and that JP8 kind of dropped down into the
- 21 elevator shafts.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: JP8 being the jet fuel.
- 2 MAJ CHIN: Yes.
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: For someone listening to this who
- 4 doesn't know that.
- 5 MAJ CHIN: That that whole building just acted
- 6 like a chimney, like a flue that -- the intensity of
- 7 the heat that they were kind of expecting was at least
- 8 2,400 degrees Fahrenheit and that everything was just
- 9 disintegrated, concrete, and it's unbelievable.
- I understand that what facade of the building
- 11 that is embedded into the side there, I understood from
- 12 LT McCaffrey, from the ESU Squad had mentioned to me
- 13 that they realized that that piece of the facade that's
- 14 sticking out over on Church Street --
- 15 **MAJ MELNYK:** The South Tower.
- 16 MAJ CHIN: Yes. Was the 69th and 71st floor.
- 17 Apparently, they tried to take one of the cranes and
- 18 pull it out and then maybe lay it down on the street to
- 19 torch it down, but they weren't even able to get that
- 20 out.
- They kind of suspect that when that fell, it's

- 1 probably embedded about two stories in the ground.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: So that's not the base of the
- 3 building that everybody sees there.
- 4 MAJ CHIN: Right, it's not. It's the 69th and
- 5 71st floor and how they could tell that it's those
- 6 particular floors is that when this World Trade Center
- 7 was built, all of that was kind of marked and then
- 8 saying that, all right, this is the 69th floor, the
- 9 71st floor, this is now where they started craning up
- 10 and when it was built, that's where it was.
- 11 So that's how they know.
- 12 MAJ MELNYK: The original markings.
- 13 **MAJ CHIN:** Right. Right.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: That's something new. I hadn't
- 15 heard that before.
- 16 MAJ CHIN: One of the --
- 17 MAJ MELNYK: When did you actually lay eyes on
- 18 it? What brought you down in that vicinity?
- 19 **MAJ CHIN:** I --
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** You initially established here
- 21 down at Battery Park, but --

- 1 **MAJ CHIN:** Right.
- 2 **MAJ MELNYK:** -- what brought you forward?
- 3 MAJ CHIN: Basically, the battalion was
- 4 already told that we were going to operate down here in
- 5 the Battery Park area, and to get everyone over here
- 6 forward and start to take up missions.
- 7 Once that pretty much set in, I started to
- 8 report in. I ran into MAJ Magnanini and we kind of
- 9 rallied up together. We got our information. We were
- 10 in contact with the 42nd Division EOC up in Troy, New
- 11 York, reported to colonel Luthringer, COL Hefner, at
- 12 that point.
- 13 The whole division staff actually was out at
- 14 Fort Leavenworth for the Warfighter ramp-up, combat
- 15 BCTP [Battle Command Training Program] seminar out
- 16 there, and at that point, the FAA had restricted all
- 17 air flights throughout the country. Nothing was flying
- 18 in and flying out.
- 19 MAJ MELNYK: Did you have contact with the
- 20 actual command and control element of the 53rd Troop
- 21 Command or did you just contact --

- 1 MAJ CHIN: I contacted the division. I did
- 2 speak to Command Sergeant Major -- I can't think of his
- 3 name right now.
- 4 **MAJ MELNYK:** At Troop Command?
- 5 MAJ CHIN: No. Up at division.
- 6 **MAJ MELNYK:** At division.
- 7 MAJ CHIN: And I was basically told that to
- 8 stay down here, not to report up to Troy, and I kind of
- 9 reported in to LTC Markey from the 107th. He's out of
- 10 the 53rd Troop Command, and basically that's where I
- 11 was working out of.
- 12 And then I kind of reported back down here as
- 13 being liaison, just to get a feel and report back to
- 14 the Troop Command.
- 15 **MAJ MELNYK:** At what point did you break off
- 16 from your association with your old unit, the 101, and
- 17 become the liaison to the civilian authorities that you
- 18 became?
- 19 MAJ CHIN: I think it was basically around
- 20 probably Wednesday night, late Wednesday night into
- 21 Thursday.

- 1 MAJ MELNYK: And so you stayed here while the
- 2 rest of the battalion went back to Staten Island.
- 3 MAJ CHIN: Yeah. Pretty much when Bravo and
- 4 Charlie Company had showed up, they appeared here down
- 5 at the Battery Park and at that point, then I had broke
- 6 loose.
- 7 **MAJ MELNYK:** And the S-3, at that point,
- 8 arrived with the -- the XO arrived.
- 9 MAJ CHIN: The XO arrived, yes.
- 10 MAJ MELNYK: With those companies.
- 11 MAJ CHIN: Yes.
- 12 MAJ MELNYK: And the S-3 was en route still.
- 13 **MAJ CHIN:** Right. Right.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: From there, what led you into
- 15 that role?
- 16 **MAJ CHIN:** Into what role?
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** Into the role of liaison. Nobody
- 18 ordered you to become the liaison to the police or the
- 19 fire or you were hooked up with MAJ Magnanini.
- 20 MAJ CHIN: That was pretty much the directive
- 21 from LTC Luthringer, who is the G-3 for the 42nd

- 1 Division. He said that, you know, since MAJ Magnanini
- 2 and myself were on site here, that we should probably
- 3 be the division reps, and at that point, I believe the
- 4 Aviation Brigade from Patchogue had arrived and it was
- 5 under the command of COL Meskill and COL Doyle. [COL
- 6 Doyle was scheduled to assume command of the Aviation
- 7 Bde on 1 Oct 03]
- 8 MAJ MELNYK: Aviation Brigade got on the
- 9 ground and assumed control, tactical control on
- 10 Saturday.
- 11 **MAJ CHIN:** Right.
- 12 MAJ MELNYK: So prior to Saturday, you did
- 13 what?
- 14 MAJ CHIN: Basically, what happened was the
- 15 lower Manhattan area was broken down to seven sectors
- 16 or seven zones and I was responsible for zone one,
- 17 which was the World Towers site.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** Ground zero.
- 19 MAJ CHIN: Ground zero.
- 20 **MAJ MELNYK:** Or the pile or the pit, as
- 21 everybody has been calling it.

- 1 MAJ CHIN: Yeah. We had basically four
- 2 officers that were assigned here. So sector six and
- 3 seven was really not covered. Seven was pretty much
- 4 the perimeter of one, one being just the ground zero
- 5 site.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: Seven is the outer perimeter.
- 7 **MAJ CHIN:** Yes.
- 8 **MAJ MELNYK:** Yeah.
- 9 **MAJ CHIN:** And --
- 10 MAJ MELNYK: Six is all above Canal Street,
- 11 where there was no crisis.
- 12 MAJ CHIN: Right. At that point, I was told
- 13 to report with the Police Chief Fox, and he was working
- 14 the day shift, and night shift was Deputy Chief
- 15 Esposito, and I believe there was a Chief H-o-e-h-l, I
- 16 believe his name is Hoehl. He's the overall three star
- 17 in the NYPD. They have these three stars and I guess
- 18 they're called chief or deputy chief.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** And where was this location?
- 20 **MAJ CHIN:** This was on Vesey Street and
- 21 Church, basically right in front of the American

- 1 Express Building on Vesey Street, and that street was
- 2 basically used for the New York Fire Department and the
- 3 New York City Police Department as a staging area,
- 4 having these guys go out to ground zero and trying to
- 5 do a rescue and recovery mission there.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: When, again, did you report
- 7 there?
- 8 MAJ CHIN: Basically, probably around
- 9 Thursday, Thursday --
- 10 **MAJ MELNYK:** Around Thursday.
- 11 MAJ CHIN: I can't give you the time. I'm
- 12 starting to lose track of time frames here. And at
- 13 that point, I was to report to the police chief and
- 14 coordinate with him to see what kind of assistance that
- 15 the National Guard Troops can do, what our capabilities
- 16 were.
- 17 At that point, the 42nd Aviation had their S-
- 18 1, S-4 and S-3 Expandovans set up. Cell phones were
- 19 given out to all the liaison officers and we were
- 20 supposed to just keep giving spot situation reports in.
- 21 Whatever missions that the city officials

- 1 requested, try to find out what the battalions had
- 2 available to do that, and if we could provide that
- 3 mission.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: So you took the mission straight
- 5 from the chief and transmitted that to who?
- 6 MAJ CHIN: Over to the TOC area here.
- 7 MAJ MELNYK: To the Aviation elements that
- 8 were on the ground.
- 9 MAJ CHIN: Aviation Brigade. Yes.
- 10 **MAJ MELNYK:** Beginning Thursday.
- 11 MAJ CHIN: Thursday.
- 12 **MAJ MELNYK:** Yeah.
- 13 MAJ CHIN: Yes.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: And they would then distribute it
- 15 down to the battalions.
- 16 **MAJ CHIN:** Right.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** Whoever could handle it.
- 18 MAJ CHIN: Right. And basically, the 101 CAV
- 19 had zone two, which was Battery Park south up to
- 20 probably Wall Street, along Broadway.
- Zone five I think was the 258, and that kind

- 1 of stretched from Water Street or Broad Street down to
- 2 the South Street, all the way up to around Liberty.
- 3 Zone four went from Liberty all the way up
- 4 north to about Canal Street, I would say.
- 5 But we did have a -- I did spend some time
- 6 probably around Wednesday down on Peck Slip Street and
- 7 South Street. The NYPD basically had their command
- 8 post set up there.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: Peck Slip and not Pike?
- 10 **MAJ CHIN:** Yeah.
- 11 MAJ MELNYK: Several people identified as Pike
- 12 Street and looking on the map, I couldn't find a Pike,
- 13 but I found Peck Slip.
- 14 MAJ CHIN: The general vicinity was basically
- 15 right -- directly underneath the Manhattan Bridge.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: The Manhattan Bridge or Brooklyn?
- 17 MAJ CHIN: Manhattan. Manhattan Bridge.
- 18 MAJ MELNYK: Manhattan Bridge. And people --
- 19 MAJ CHIN: Yeah. That was the initial site
- 20 for all the NYPD and they wanted the 101 CAV TOC to be
- 21 stationed there, and basically I just reported there, I

- 1 guess, prior to going up to the 53rd Troop Command.
- 2 But everything was phenomenal. It almost --
- 3 the people, food, everything, just -- it just came out
- 4 of nowhere.
- 5 There was no problem of eating or anything of
- 6 that sort. There was still problems trying to
- 7 communicate in the city here with the cell phone, but
- 8 from that point, a lot of the zone commanders, they
- 9 established these seven zones and they sent in these
- 10 mobile -- it almost looks like a Winnebago type deal,
- 11 and they started establishing, each chief, like lower
- 12 Manhattan, Brooklyn south, all sorts of areas.
- Manhattan south, Queens south, Brooklyn south.
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Queens north.
- MAJ CHIN: Queens north.
- 16 MAJ MELNYK: Right. Each one (inaudible.)
- 17 MAJ CHIN: Manhattan north. Yeah.
- 18 **MAJ MELNYK:** Right.
- 19 MAJ CHIN: And each one of those zones was
- 20 dictated to those particular precincts in the area.
- 21 MAJ MELNYK: So there was a liaison officer in

- 1 each of those areas and you were at the main
- 2 headquarters for the whole effort.
- 3 **MAJ CHIN:** Right.
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: Peck Slip and South.
- 5 **MAJ CHIN:** Right. But then after Peck Slip
- 6 and South, once these seven zones were set up, that was
- 7 pretty much disbanded at that point. There was no
- 8 longer a need for a centralized area there.
- 9 They did keep some kind of one van there, but
- 10 pretty much the -- everybody seemed to go directed
- 11 towards their individual zones and basically there was
- 12 a meeting every day at One Police Plaza, with all the
- 13 deputy chiefs for --
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Where is One Police Plaza? For
- 15 those who don't know New York.
- 16 MAJ CHIN: One Police Plaza is on Pearl
- 17 Street, right along the Brooklyn Bridge, right in front
- 18 of Chambers Street, just down the street from city
- 19 hall.
- 20 And we were reporting in basically at 1200
- 21 hours there, although the liaisons would show up and

- 1 COL Doyle would be there meeting with the chiefs and we
- 2 would get a rundown from each one of the chiefs as to
- 3 the --
- 4 MAJ MELNYK: COL Doyle was the --
- 5 MAJ CHIN: The basic overall OIC going in to
- 6 talk with them and then we were there just to get our
- 7 chiefs in each particular zone to find out what changes
- 8 were made and then confirm that with COL Doyle.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: COL Doyle was operating that from
- 10 Aviation Brigade as the --
- 11 MAJ CHIN: Right. But he --
- 12 **MAJ MELNYK:** -- executive officer.
- 13 MAJ CHIN: That's correct. He would then
- 14 report in to the 1200 meeting, as well.
- 15 MAJ MELNYK: And he would take charge --
- 16 MAJ CHIN: At One Police Plaza.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** -- of the liaisons. And what
- 18 kind of changes would you discuss?
- 19 MAJ CHIN: Well, for instance, I believe on
- 20 Sunday night, we met there around 2300, because now
- 21 Monday they were going to begin allowing the civilians

- 1 or the New Yorkers to begin returning to lower
- 2 Manhattan in certain areas, and --
- 3 MAJ MELNYK: To go to work.
- 4 MAJ CHIN: To go to work and basically the
- 5 discussion was to -- how do we go about getting the
- 6 buses in, what was open, what was operational.
- 7 The New York City Transit express buses from
- 8 Staten Island were allowed to go through the Battery
- 9 Tunnel, coming out of the Battery Tunnel on the west
- 10 side, on West Street.
- 11 They would go through -- there's a tunnel
- 12 underneath the Battery Park and would exit out of Water
- 13 Street and the express buses that were taking
- 14 passengers to midtown would proceed directly on the FDR
- 15 Drive and probably exit off of 42nd Street, 61st
- 16 Street.
- 17 Those buses that were dropping off passengers
- 18 down to the lower Manhattan area, like Wall Street,
- 19 Maiden Lane, they would take underneath the FDR Drive,
- 20 which is South Street, and then they would stop making
- 21 bus stops at Maiden Lane, Wall Street, and allowing

- 1 passengers to return to their buildings to work.
- 2 And they would basically go up to, I believe,
- 3 Houston Street and make a U-turn there, come back.
- 4 Cabs, taxis were not allowed yet in the areas.
- 5 Limos were not allowed in the areas. They were
- 6 beginning to allow delivery trucks to return into the
- 7 area. They would have basically a check point along
- 8 Church Street, Broadway, around Canal Street. They
- 9 would have show proof of lading, shipping materials.
- 10 They would check randomly some boxes. They
- 11 did have some bomb dogs to go through there, because
- 12 they weren't going to open up everything in a box
- 13 there.
- 14 They were informed as to what zones they were
- 15 able to enter in. So and so forth. I mean, that was
- 16 basically it. So it was basically just the
- 17 coordination, everything to synchronize between all
- 18 agencies and to see what was going on and also to find
- 19 out where we stood with ConEd, what buildings had
- 20 power, what buildings did not have power, how could we
- 21 utilize the Guard members there.

- 1 At one point, in the beginning, they were
- 2 using Guard members along with police officers to go
- 3 floor by floor to check some of these buildings, but
- 4 53rd Troop Command wanted that stopped.
- I don't know what reason. It might have been
- 6 maybe some legal issues or something like that.
- 7 MAJ MELNYK: When you say in the beginning,
- 8 when, to the best of your recollection?
- 9 MAJ CHIN: Probably around Saturday that was
- 10 going on. What they would do is then let the NYPD go
- 11 ahead floor by floor. They would actually also go up
- 12 on the roof, and I think what they were looking for is
- 13 any body remains that might be up there on the roof.
- Also, to check buildings that nobody -- you
- 15 know, an elderly couple that might have been through
- 16 this whole ordeal, to check to see that no one, you
- 17 know, was occupying it.
- 18 At that point, once a building was cleared,
- 19 they would station maybe a couple of Guard members in
- 20 front of the building, not allowing anyone to go in.
- One thing that was kind of eerie, you could

- 1 see that people would leave their office open and you
- 2 can see the desks with their laptops still open, a set,
- 3 a pair of glasses was sitting there, a suit jacket, a
- 4 sports jacket draped over a desk chair, and no bodies.
- 5 And it was almost an eerie feeling, like, you know,
- 6 where did everybody go. It's almost like they were
- 7 vaporized or something.
- 8 But other than that, most of the buildings did
- 9 not have power yet. GE had provided these generators
- 10 that were on a tractor-trailer and they were working
- 11 with ConEd and desperately trying to set up power for
- 12 these buildings in order to get this ready for Monday,
- 13 and I think it was probably stressed an importance
- 14 maybe from Mayor Giuliani to show that, you know, yeah,
- 15 we can set up business as usual with even this kind of
- 16 disaster.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** What was the priority for getting
- 18 power back? Was it businesses?
- 19 MAJ CHIN: What we heard was the importance
- 20 was to get Wall Street back to open.
- 21 **MAJ MELNYK:** The stock exchange and the --

- 1 MAJ CHIN: The stock exchange.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: -- associated businesses.
- 3 MAJ CHIN: Yeah. And that was the number one
- 4 priority.
- 5 MAJ MELNYK: What role did the Guard play in
- 6 helping that happen? What kind of missions did you
- 7 help arrange?
- 8 MAJ CHIN: I did not have too much hands on.
- 9 Probably MAJ Magnanini, who was pretty much down in
- 10 this area here, or the 642 and the 258 were basically -
- 11 pretty much the 69th was down here, down in this
- 12 lower area.
- 13 MAJ MELNYK: So amongst the agencies, you had
- 14 mentioned ConEd was there, obviously the PD, they ran
- 15 the show, fire department, I assume, would attend or
- 16 were they strictly involved with --
- 17 MAJ CHIN: No. They were pretty much with the
- 18 rescue and recovery operations there.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** Any other element that --
- 20 **MAJ CHIN:** We had a lot of Verizon people
- 21 here. The one that I've seen is that the abundance of

- 1 agencies that were down here, Federal Marshals, outside
- 2 county people, other county police departments from
- 3 outside of New York were here, cadaver dogs were all
- 4 over the place from various parts of the country that
- 5 were in here, numerous volunteers that were just
- 6 phenomenal at what type of support that was giving to
- 7 New Yorkers and to the fire department, police
- 8 department.
- 9 I've got to commend most of these construction
- 10 workers. You know, you hear so much in the news about
- 11 the fire department, not to take credit away from them,
- 12 or the police department, but these ironworkers who are
- 13 able to get these large cranes and torch everything
- 14 apart and get that away, you know.
- Talking to the 204th Engineers, most of the
- 16 equipment that they have is not even capable of doing
- 17 that. So, I mean, my -- me personally is my hat's off
- 18 to them.
- 19 MAJ MELNYK: What -- most of the people that I
- 20 have interviewed so far have commented on the positive
- 21 relationships that overwhelmingly they had conducting

- 1 liaison with the -- primarily the police department and
- 2 fire department.
- First off, did you generally share -- agree
- 4 with that?
- 5 **MAJ CHIN:** Absolutely, yeah.
- 6 MAJ MELNYK: Having said that, what kind of
- 7 problems did you face and where did you have to smooth
- 8 things over, if at all, between the Guard and the
- 9 civilian authorities?
- 10 MAJ CHIN: Basically, we had to get a clear
- 11 understanding as to what our mission as the Guard to be
- 12 here. A lot of the OEMs from the Mayor's office and
- 13 stuff, there wasn't much of a good in synchronization
- 14 between agencies.
- And a good example is the fire department
- 16 command post. Basically, I tried to ask the police
- 17 chief if they had contact with the fire department, and
- 18 it was basically their own entity.
- 19 So basically as the liaison officer for so
- 20 long, I reported in to the fire department's command
- 21 post, which is also like a Winnebago type deal, and

- 1 reported in there and seen -- introduced myself and
- 2 told them as to what capabilities we had or if they had
- 3 any issues or concerns and what kind of capacities that
- 4 they could find out from me.
- 5 Basically, I left my cell number that I was
- 6 assigned and keep people down here at the TOC, at the
- 7 Aviation, and also inform them that MAJ Jeff Seals, who
- 8 is the battalion commander of the 204th, gave his cell
- 9 number and told them primarily who the key players are
- 10 down here.
- I also touched base again, like I said before,
- 12 with the police command center. ESU was located down
- 13 at Stuyvesant High School, checked in there.
- I tried to make my rounds all throughout the
- 15 zone there.
- 16 **MAJ MELNYK:** Pretty much every day?
- 17 MAJ CHIN: Pretty much every day. I did find
- 18 out probably about Saturday or Sunday morning, I
- 19 understood that there was the 179th Air Guard, I
- 20 believe, out of Syracuse [correction 174<sup>th</sup> Fighter
- 21 Wing]. They had a communication team up there and they

- 1 were just pulling out.
- 2 So coordination between the Air Guard and the
- 3 Army National Guard, that was a problem there.
- 4 I also did see that there was also a Marine
- 5 Corps group here. I'm not -- I just only met MAJ
- 6 Fisher today and I kind of coordinated with him at the
- 7 police command center there, just kind of spoke with
- 8 him briefly, until something critical came up that I
- 9 had --
- 10 MAJ MELNYK: That's interesting. Were they
- 11 volunteers?
- 12 MAJ CHIN: That I don't know.
- 13 **MAJ MELNYK:** I was not aware of troops here in
- 14 a Federal status.
- 15 MAJ CHIN: I don't know. I don't know if they
- 16 were reservists or active component. I don't even know
- 17 what their capabilities were or what they were actually
- 18 doing, if they had something to do with the excavation.
- 19 **MAJ MELNYK:** They were in uniform.
- 20 **MAJ CHIN:** Yes.
- 21 MAJ MELNYK: I guess they were under orders.

- 1 **MAJ CHIN:** Yeah.
- 2 MAJ MELNYK: That's an interesting thing that
- 3 probably needs to be investigated further, because
- 4 everybody here is under the impression that the only
- 5 troops on ground are state active duty for New York
- 6 National Guard.
- 7 MAJ CHIN: No. There were Air Force -- or Air
- 8 Guard members here.
- 9 MAJ MELNYK: But that's still New York
- 10 National Guard.
- 11 MAJ CHIN: I would believe so. And there
- 12 could be something that could be out of state, as well,
- 13 that I'm not aware of. But --
- 14 MAJ MELNYK: Thank you.
- 15 MAJ CHIN: Other than that, I don't know what
- 16 more to say.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** Well, sir, your overall
- 18 impressions, as a final thought, in terms of what
- 19 significance does this have to you and what
- 20 significance do you think it's going to have for the
- 21 New York National Guard, particularly here in New York

- 1 City?
- 2 MAJ CHIN: The funny thing about it was last
- 3 September of last year, I was asked if I can attend the
- 4 force protection anti-terrorist class down at Park
- 5 Avenue Armory, and I believe that was SGT Rosencrantz
- 6 (phonetic,) who is from STARC, and we had a couple of
- 7 -- a major, I don't recall his name, and another senior
- 8 NCO that provided that class.
- 9 And the key issue was to start all of the
- 10 armories to set up a force protection SOP and basically
- 11 that was just completed probably about a month ago up
- 12 in the Troy Armory.
- 13 MAJ MELNYK: Many of the men I've spoken to,
- 14 officers and men I have spoken to complained about lack
- of force protection and not being allowed to carry
- 16 their weapons, and they are still under the impression
- 17 to this moment that there is a threat of terrorist
- 18 attack.
- 19 **MAJ CHIN:** My concern right now is that we did
- 20 get reports about a missing Verizon vehicle yesterday
- 21 and we did understand that it was just misplaced.

- 1 The first thing that comes to mind is Beirut,
- 2 you know. What capabilities do we have right now where
- 3 we only have our soldiers not even armed no longer. I
- 4 mean, they weren't carrying ammunition, but how do you
- 5 go about stopping a vehicle at these checkpoints, with
- 6 numerous, hundreds and hundreds of people here right
- 7 now, to stop a vehicle going 50 or 80 miles an hour,
- 8 with possibly explosives there.
- 9 That to me is a concern. I think since '93,
- 10 with the [first] attack on the World Trade Center, you
- 11 know, we knew that maybe somehow that this was going to
- 12 happen, but, you know, what we were going to do, and
- 13 now that this happened, I think it changes the entire
- 14 perspective that America has at this point in time,
- 15 that it's probably finally reached here in the United
- 16 States where we've only seen it in other countries.
- 17 **MAJ MELNYK:** I would agree. Thank you very
- 18 much.
- 19 (The interview was concluded.)
